Given that there is complexity to matching teams and founders, we will endeavor to place you with one of your top three choices of small businesses to work with and expect that you will remain enrolled in the course if you are matched as such. Please let us know via email ASAP if your plans or intentions have changed. Note that the class will meet on "Y" day Wednesdays and Thursdays; most Fridays will be reserved for team time (i.e. class will not meet).


Course Overview

Investing for Impact (IFI) has both a class (case-based) and field component. For the field component, student teams will work closely with a small, Boston-based business to perform thorough due diligence (financial, operational, commercial) and ultimately present their findings and a fundraising strategy and/or an investment recommendation (for \$25,000 to \$50,000) to an Investment Committee comprised of HBS alumni. We will be working with local intermediaries such as Nectar, Commonwealth Kitchen, Boston Impact Initiative, LEAF and the BostonXChange. 


