

Gesture Expansions

If the child communicates using a gesture, we can expand by giving a reciprocal gesture and saying a label for what the interest is.

Example 1: *child:* {points at the pan} \rightarrow *adult:* {points at the pan} "pan"

Example 2: *child:* {shows the bubble bottle} \rightarrow *adult:* {points to the bubble bottle} "bubbles!"

Example 3: child: {gives the cup} \rightarrow adult: {shows the cup} "cup"

gestures can be used in any expansion

Single Word Expansions

If the child communicates using a word, we can expand by putting that word in a related sentence.

Example 1: *child:* "in" \rightarrow *adult:* "the plate is in the oven"

Example 2: child: "spoon" \rightarrow adult: "the spoon is hot"

Example 3: child: "ball" \rightarrow adult: "the ball is bouncing"

Sentence Expansions

If the child communicates using a sentence, we can expand by making the sentence more specific, or correcting the sentence if needed.

Example 1: child: "it fell" \rightarrow adult: "the blocks fell"

Example 2: child: "I want that" \rightarrow adult: "you want the rice"

Example 3: child: "the dog eated" \rightarrow adult: "the dog ate"

What if the child says a complete sentence?

If the child communicates using a great sentence, we do not expand. We can respond with another great, related sentence.

Example 1: *child:* "the water is boiling" \rightarrow *adult:* "now the pasta goes in the water"

Example 2: child: "the pizza is ready" \rightarrow adult: "my knife can cut the pizza"

Example 3: child: "it's the cats turn" \rightarrow adult: "the cat is taking a bath"
