

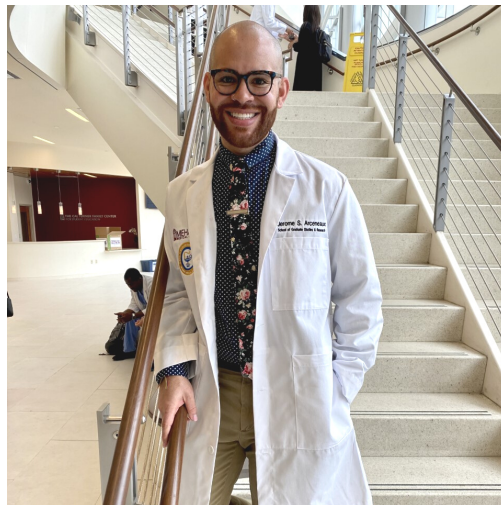

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## **LOCAL STUDENT CONTINUES LEADERSHIP ON THE STUDENT NATIONAL MEDICAL ASSOCIATION (SNMA) BOARD OF DIRECTORS**



The 2020 Virtual SNMA Annual Medical Education Conference (AMEC) was from April 16th – April 19th. At this convention, **Mr. Jerome Arceneux** was appointed to the position of **National Community Service Committee Co-Chairperson**. At the 2020 AMEC, medical students and professionals attended a wide range of educational and networking events. It is consistently the largest gathering of underrepresented minority medical students at any time of the year in any place in the nation.

Jerome Arceneux is from Houston, TX, by way of Hayden, AL. He graduated from the University of Alabama at Birmingham with a BS in Biochemistry with Departmental Honors. He is currently an MD/PhD candidate and His PhD will be in Biomedical Sciences with a concentration in Neuroscience. Currently, Jerome is the Treasurer of the Graduate Student Association at Meharry Medical College School of Graduate Studies and Research and the Social Co-Chair of the Neuroscience Student Organization at Vanderbilt University.



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This past year, Jerome had the privilege to serve as the National Parliamentarian of the Student National Medical Association and the Executive Vice President of the Graduate Student Association at Meharry Medical College School of Graduate Studies and Research.

Outside of school organizations, Jerome is an active TA and tutors all of the subjects the medical and graduate schools offer at Meharry Medical College. When he is not conducting experiments or studying, Jerome enjoys spending time with his friends, eating out, watching TV, reading, and riding his bike.

Jerome is very interested in pursuing a residency in Neurosurgery. He has yet to decide if he wants his own lab, but he does intend to engage in research throughout his career.
