


Abstract

Between 1880 and 1950, international law enforcement networks took shape in response to elite anxieties around the transnationalization of crime. In North America, the rise of European fascism gave rise to initiatives among police in the United States, Canada, and Mexico to improve cooperation and professional relations through annual professional conferences and international organizations. This project seeks both to map these junctures of police internationalization during the Interwar Period and to establish a website that documents who attended, where they travelled, topics they debated, publicity they received, and eventually to map the professional networks of the police officials involved. The website will provide a central repository for historians of policing.

Data Sets

The project relies primarily on organizational publications and newspapers including:

- Pacific Coast International 1937-1945 (USA)
- The Oregonian (USA)
- Detective Internacional 1934-1945 (MX)







• Bata from the primary sources was manually extracted and compiled into spreadsheets.

- Only the conference data currently exists on the website.
- In the future, social network data that maps recruiting for the Pacific Coast International will be introduced to both the database and the map.
- Each of these spreadsheets, saved as CSV, is fed into the Drupal content management system and turned into content.
- The content is then mapped and made available as both downloadable CSVs and searchable web content on the site.


