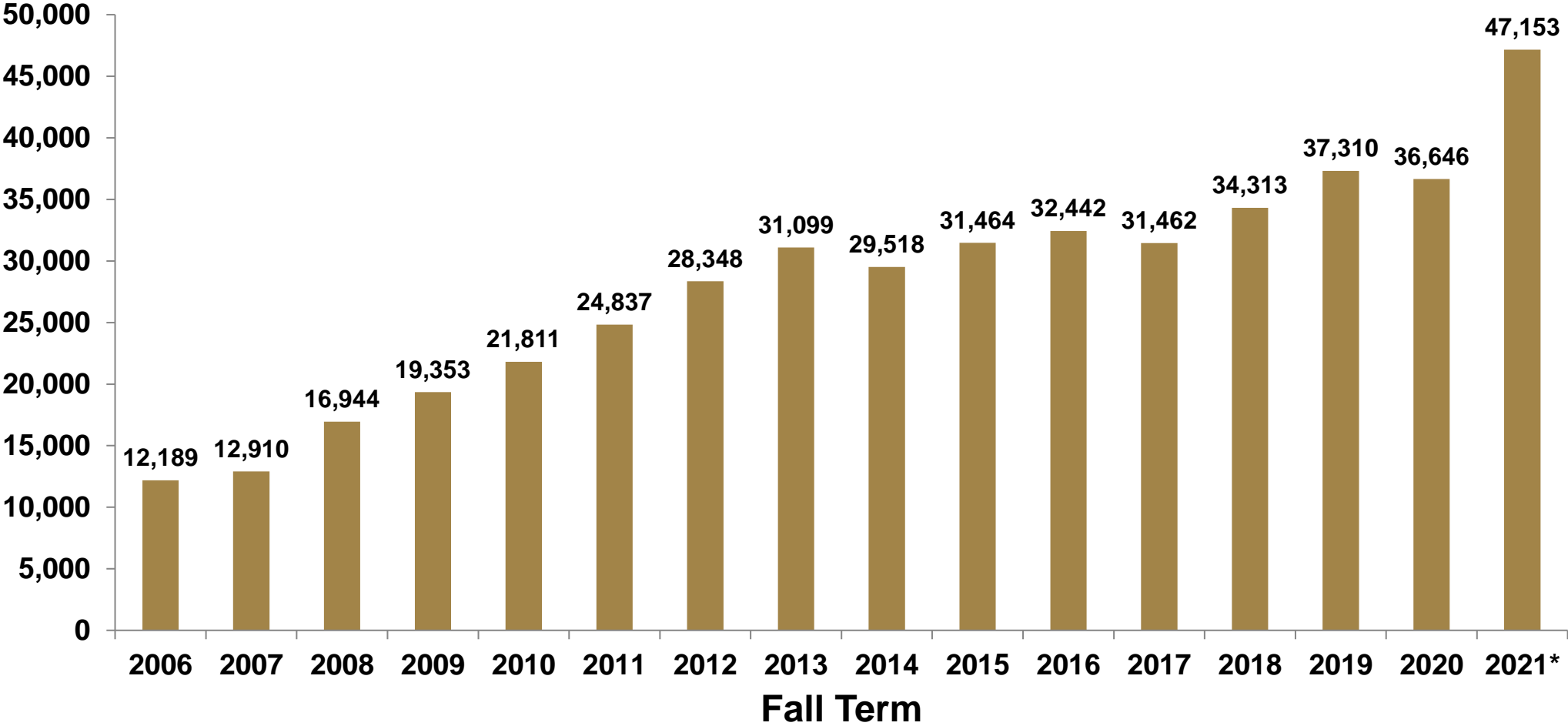

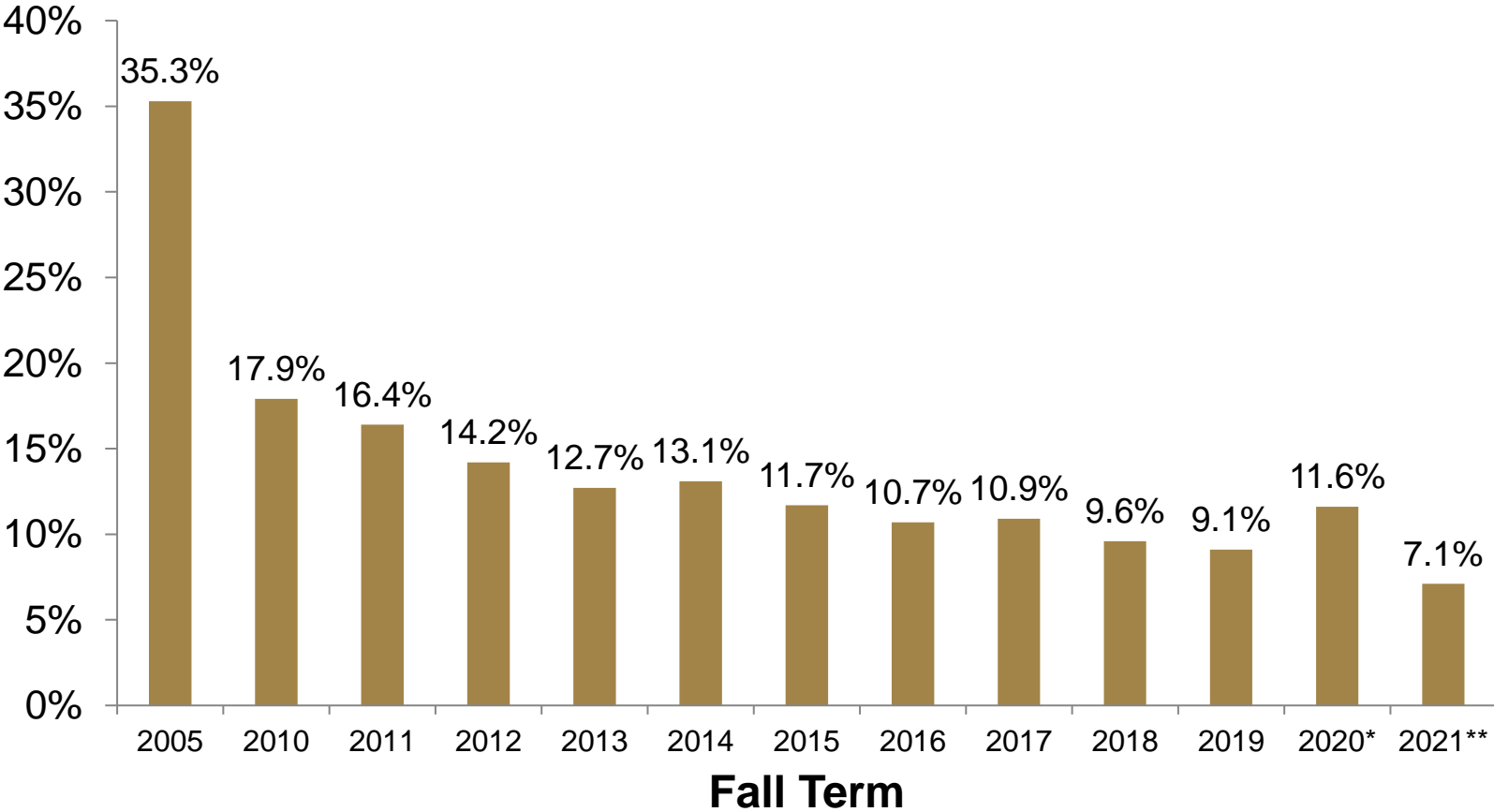

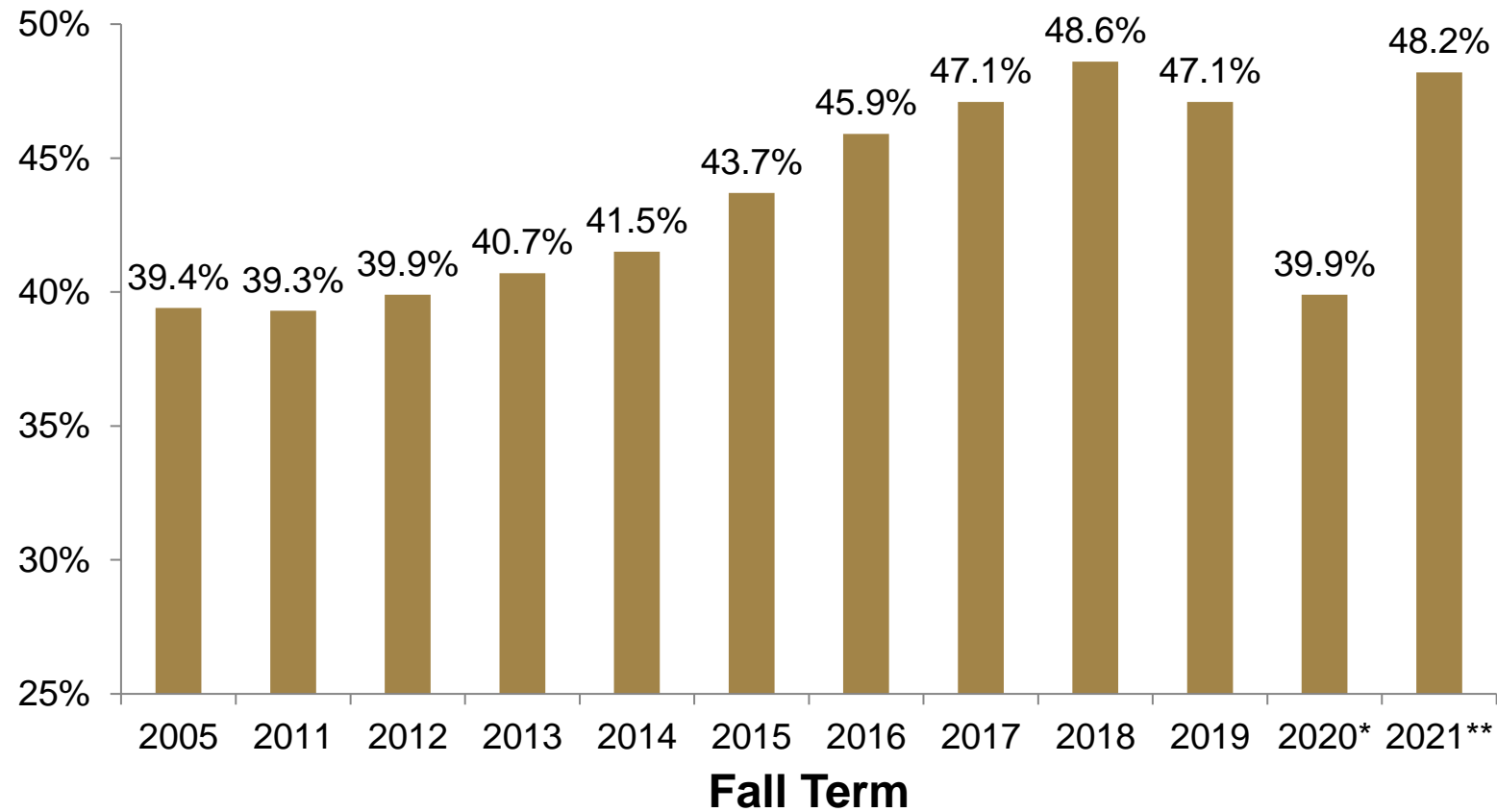
Percent of Applicants Admitted

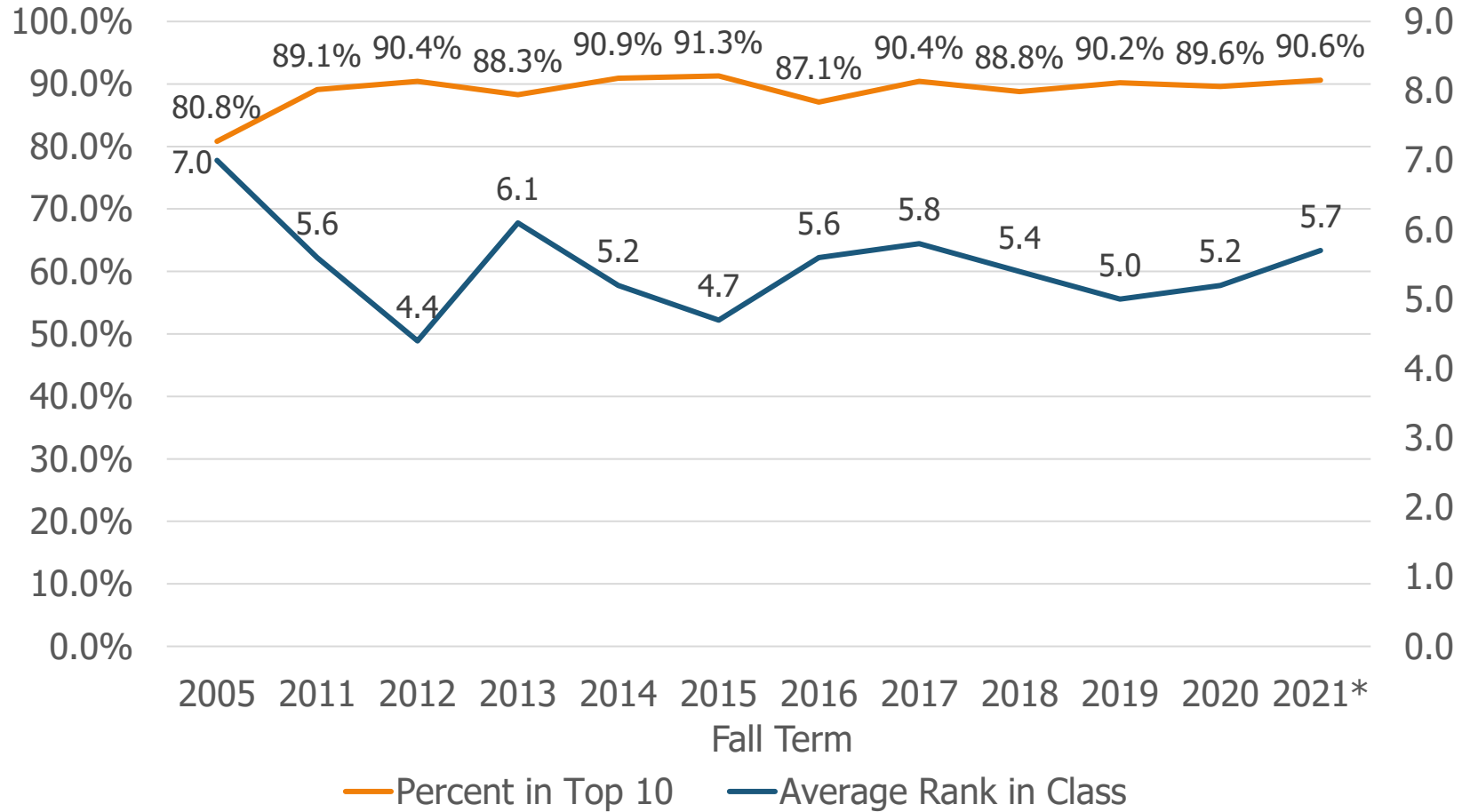
First-Year Class Yield



* Lower than typical yield due to COVID-19. Many upstream peers admitted more students to secure their enrollment as did Vanderbilt.

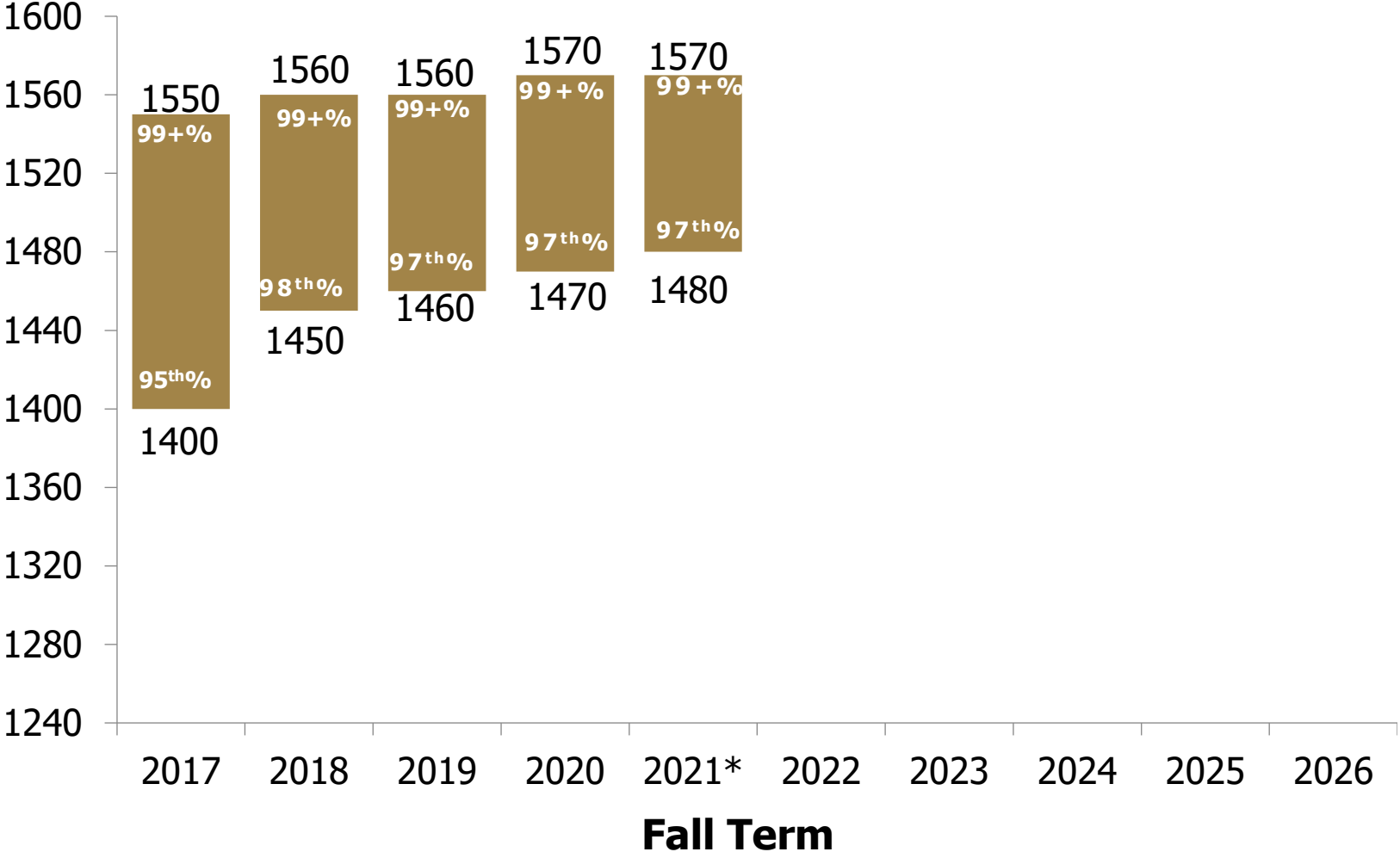

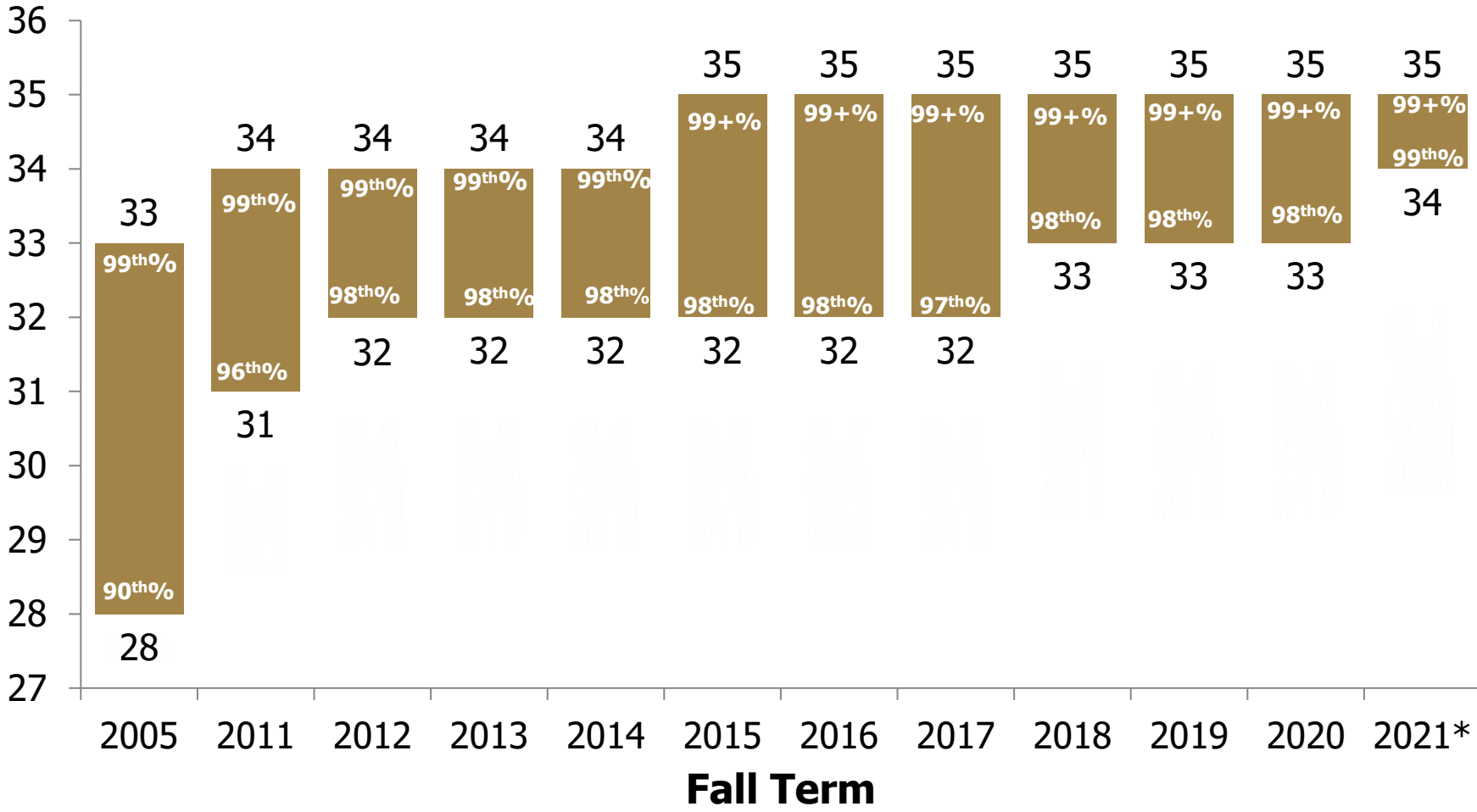
New SAT Middle 50%

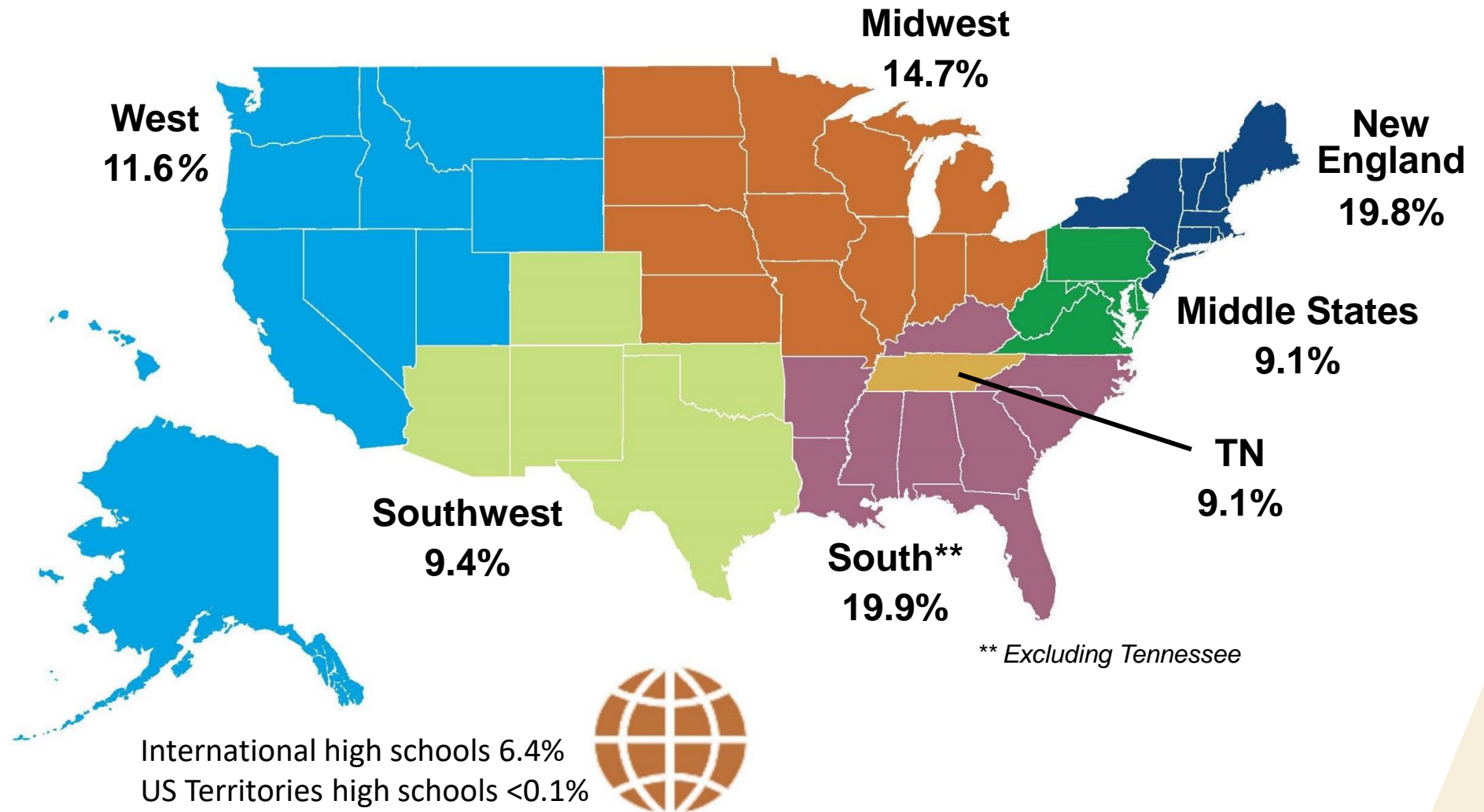
First-Time-In-College Class Honors: Class of 2024

- Listed below are some of the most outstanding accomplishments from the students of the Class of 2024.

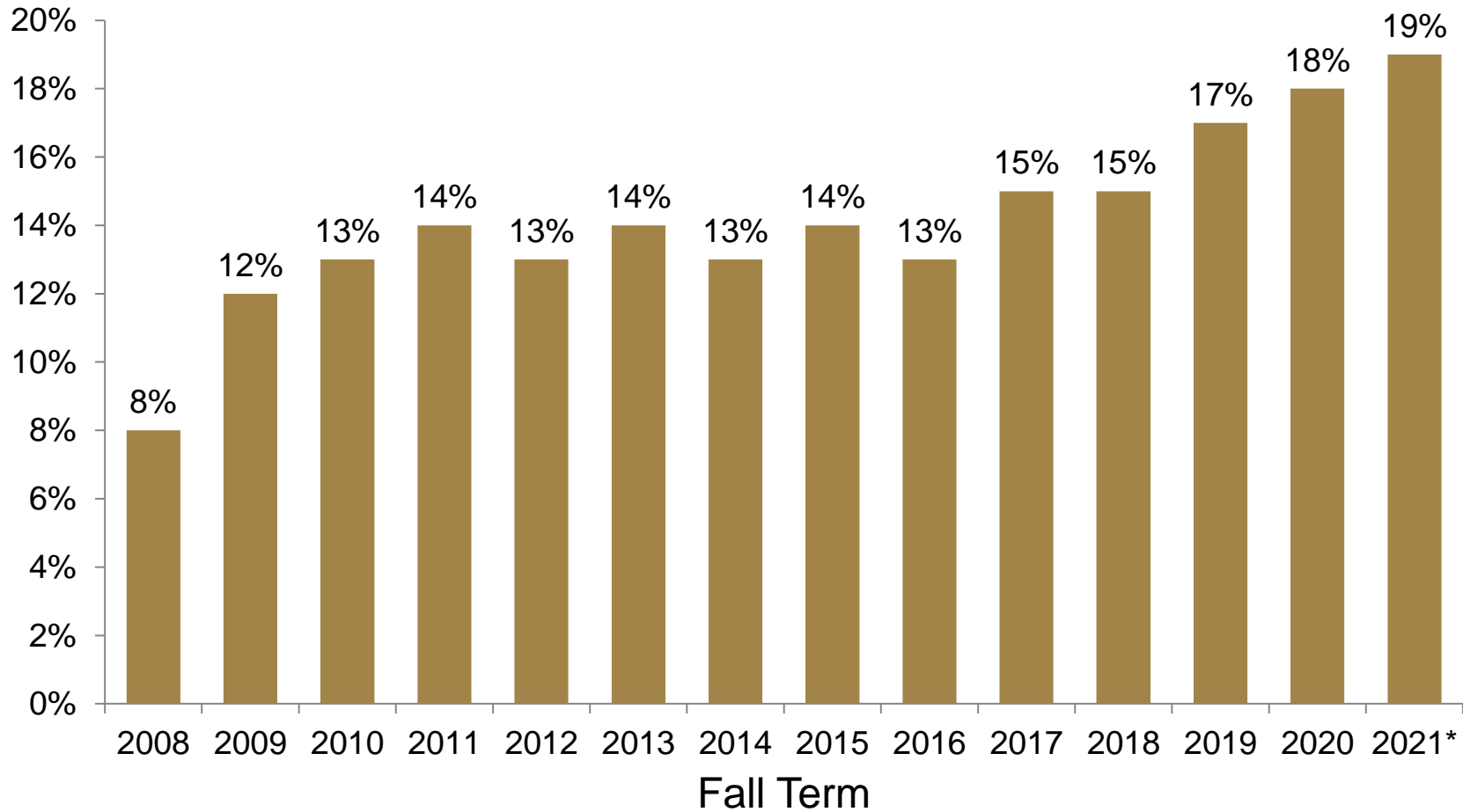
Please note – many students are on multiple lists due to their varied and numerous leadership and scholarship roles:

- Of the 1,698 members of this year's first-year class, 100% held the highest level of leadership or scholarship, or were engaged in national-level honor societies such as:
 - Student Body President
 - Class President
 - Student Senator
 - Editor-in-chief of school newspaper or yearbook
 - Eagle Scout / Girl Scout Gold
 - National Honor Societies
- Direct leadership and/or scholarship roles include:
 - Academic Leaders: 90%
 - Athletic Leaders and Champions: 53%
 - Fine Arts Leaders: 34%
 - Service Leaders: 86%
 - Student Government Leaders: 31%
 - Other Honors & Awards: 71%
