ANNUAL REPORT 2020-2021

YEAR IN REVIEW

The 2020-2021 academic year was associated with many challenges and changes across the university. For the Office of Postdoctoral Affairs, this was also a period of restructuring and change.

On July 1, 2020, OPA was moved from the Graduate School to the Office of the Provost. At that time, former Senior Assistant Provost, Sally Parker, assumed the role as Interim Director of OPA. Additionally, Faith Bishop, who was currently working with postdoctoral fellows in the School of Medicine, joined OPA as the Interim Program Manager on July 1, 2020. In September of 2020, a new Program and Communications Manager came on board, Caitlin Haskell, and immediately jumped into her work, making connections across Vanderbilt University and Vanderbilt University Medical Center.


There were several innovations put in place so that OPA communications were streamlined and more effective. To this end, the OPA website was revamped and moved to **vu.edu/postdocs**. OPA monthly newsletters also received an HTML format to match other university newsletters and established branding guidelines. Further, a dedicated page was added to the website to archive past communications. Additionally, OPA New Postdoc Orientation was revamped, and many improvements were made to the REDCap system for appointments and reappointments.

As a small, but centralized office, the OPA aims to leverage resources across the university and

Medical Center and incorporate these events and programming into the postdoc experience. In the 2020-2021 academic year, the OPA and the Vanderbilt Postdoctoral Association partnered with eight campus departments and offices for 19 events.

Similar to the rest of the university, OPA had to guickly pivot to meet the needs of our postdoctoral fellows during the COVID-19 pandemic. In a virtual, masked-up, and physically distant world, our office had to be creative as we celebrated our postdocs during National Postdoc Appreciation Week. Leadership from around the university and Medical Center provided their gratitude to the community via short videos, postdocs had the opportunity to sit for (physically distanced) new headshots, and a virtual social hour celebration took place for postdocs to network. In addition, a special "Wellness Wednesday" seminar was offered in the middle of the week and an article regarding Postdoc Appreciation Week was featured in MyVU.

Due to the uncertainty at the beginning of the pandemic, the annual VPA Postdoctoral Symposium was moved from its scheduled date in April to a virtual format in October. The symposium utilized technologies, including

Zoom and Gather.town, to create a successful and interactive symposium with lightning round talks, a keynote address by Mathematician and Statistician, Chad Topaz, a poster session and open house, and even a networking happy hour.

To determine the needs of the postdoctoral community and how the office would best be structured, a Postdoctoral Working Group was created in the fall of 2020. Additionally, in collaboration with the Office of Planning and Institutional Effectiveness, OPA gathered postdoc feedback from a survey that spanned one month at the end of 2020.

Based on feedback from the Postdoctoral Working Group and the postdoc community survey, it was determined that the OPA would move into the portfolio of Vice Provost of Graduate Education, André Christie-Mizell, who became Director of OPA on February 15, 2021. In March 2021, Faith Bishop was hired as the Assistant Director of OPA, bringing knowledge from working with postdocs in the School of Medicine, spanning both VU and VUMC, as well as her experience as Interim Program Manager of OPA since July 2020.

OPA and VPA wrapped up the end of this academic year with the annual Postdoctoral

Awards Ceremony, with the addition of one new award category, Postdoc Mentor of the Year. The ceremony was held virtually, as was everything this past year, but the excitement for the nominees and winners was no less thrilling. We had 47 nominees over four categories, with four award winners and four honorable mentions showcasing the strong research work, as well as the resiliency of our postdoc community, over the past year. We utilized InfoReady, a university system that had not been used previously by OPA, to collect nominations and score the nominees.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

OPA looks forward to normalcy as we are planning a return to campus in the coming months. In the meantime, we are continuing to plan for in person and virtual programming, including a fall VPA Symposium. Upcoming programming includes Health and Wellness topics as we partner with Work/ Life Connections, focused programming for international postdocs, and continued partnerships with other departments, centers, and institutes around Vanderbilt.



WHAT IS A POSTDOC?

Vanderbilt postdoctoral fellows, commonly known as postdocs, are professionals who have earned doctoral degrees and are, in most cases, temporarily pursuing additional scholarly training, experience and research progress necessary for a wide range of career paths. Postdocs play an important role in Vanderbilt's research enterprise and are integral to the discovery and learning mission of Vanderbilt University and Medical Center. At any given time, **Vanderbilt has around 500 postdocs across both VU and VUMC**.



MISSION

The Office of Postdoctoral Affairs is responsible for planning and managing programs and services for Vanderbilt's postdoctoral community. OPA supports Vanderbilt-affiliated postdocs as well as faculty and staff administrators who work with the postdoctoral population. OPA is the central resource for postdoctoral services and serves as a liaison among postdocs and central university administrative offices. OPA also works closely with the Vanderbilt Postdoctoral Association, formally known as the Postdoctoral Association, to address the interests and concerns of postdocs.

Quantitative Approaches to Social Justice

Civil rights leader, educator, and investigative journalist Ida B. Wells said that "the way to right wrongs is to shine the light of truth upon them." In this talk, I demonstrate how quantitative and computational approaches can shine a light on social injustices and help build solutions to remedy them. One project uses data science tools to study gender representation on mathematics journal editorial boards, finding that of 13,000 editorial positions studied, a mere 8.9% are held by women. A second project is constitutes a large scale study of gender and ethnic representation amongst artists whose works are held in the collections of major U.S. museums. We estimate that 85% of these artists are white and 87% are men. We find that the relationship between museum collection mission and artist diversity is weak, suggesting that a museum wishing to increase diversity might do so without changing its emphases on specific time periods and regions. Finally, I will mention other quantitative social justice projects underway in the realms of criminal justice, music, education, and more.

The keynote seminar, led by Chad Topaz, professor of mathematics at Williams College and co-founder and executive director of research for the Institute for the Quantitative Study of Inclusion, Diversity and Equity, was titled "Quantitative Approaches to Social Justice." The symposium featured study topics such as social science, materials science and biomedical science.

POSTDOC OF THE YEAR

The Postdoc of the Year award recognizes a postdoctoral scholar who demonstrates excellence in research and scholarship since January 2020. The nominee must demonstrate excellence in several criteria, including publications, presentations, awards/honors, service, and mentoring. The Office of Postdoctoral Affairs solicited nominations from faculty in each school, and the Postdoctoral Fellow Advisory Committee reviewed and voted on all nominations.



The recipient was Lindsey Seldin, PhD, mentored by Dr. Ian Macara, Chair of the Department of Cell & Developmental Biology, Professor of

Cell & Developmental Biology and Louise B McGavock Chair.

Dr. Seldin can be described as a *"fearless experimentalist who has boundless enthusiasm, and shows unusual brilliance in her thinking about cell and developmental biology."*

Dr. Roby has served as the chair/co-chair for the VPA committee on Equity, Diversity, and Justice since the Fall 2019 academic year and has played a fundamental role in advocating for the needs of minoritized postdocs, while also aiding the organization in facilitating workshops to better equip the overall community with the tools to be more culturally competent and aware.
