EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE



Joanne Spitz, MA, CRA (Co-Chair): Joanne is the Executive Director of the Research Development and Support (RDS) team within Vanderbilt's Office of the Vice Provost for Research and Innovation. Prior to this role, she served as the Senior Director of Grant Initiatives, Corporate and Foundation Relations at Baylor University, resulting in a significant increase in Foundation and other private support for faculty researchers. Joanne also spent over 30 years in research development and pre- and post-award administration at Washington University in St. Louis in multiple departments and schools, including Neuroscience, Biology, and the Olin Business School. While at Olin, she worked for 11 years as the administrator of an interdisciplinary research network sponsored by The MacArthur Foundation. She was also instrumental in the establishment of a new grants program for the Olin School and served as its first Grant Development Manager.



Quincy Quick, PhD (Co-Chair): Quincy serves as the Associate Vice President of Research and Sponsored Programs and Chief Research Officer at Tennessee State University (TSU). As a scientist, Quincy has studied novel targets and therapeutics for the treatment of glioblastomas for the past 20 years and has been an active NIH grant reviewer, as well as reviewer and editor for several journals. Quincy has also served as a research mentor and/or coordinator on several NIH and NSF funded developmental training grant programs that include RISE, MARC, NIMH-COR, HBCU-UP, and served as the co-program director for the TSU-NERVE program, an NIH funded developmental training program to increase the number of students that earn PhDs in neuroscience. As part of these initiatives, Quincy has mentored more than 80 students at the PhD, Masters, and undergraduate levels. This service and productivity have led to Quincy being acknowledged as one of the most inspiring black scientists in the US by Cell Mentor. Furthermore, in his role as AVP of Research and Sponsored Programs, Quincy mentors and supports research efforts and development of faculty at all levels.



Sajid Hussain, PhD (Co-Chair): Sajid Hussain is Associate Provost for Research and the Director of the Office of Sponsored Research and Programs (OSP) at Fisk University. In 2009, he joined Fisk University as an Associate Professor in the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science. Prior to Fisk, he worked as Associate Professor and Assistant Professor in the Jodrey School of Computer Science, Acadia University, Canada, 2005-09. He received a Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering from the University of Manitoba, Canada, in 2004. Sajid is interested in applying machine learning to projects related to healthcare, bioinformatics, digital humanities, and criminal justice. He is also interested in energy-efficient communication protocols and security techniques for mobile, ubiquitous, and pervasive applications.



Donna Ingles, MS, MPH (Organizing Committee Member): Donna currently serves as Director of Operations for the Center for Technology Transfer and Commercialization at Vanderbilt University. Prior to this, she served as Associate Director of Research Development and has nearly 20 years of grant development experience across pre- and post-award support and research project management. Donna is the former Assistant Director of Operations for the Vanderbilt Institute for Global Health, where she focused on optimization of pre- and post-award processes, project development, and implementation, as well as research capacity-building in low- and middle-income countries. She previously worked at Moffitt Cancer Center, in Drug Discovery and then in Epidemiology, culminating in a senior position within the Center for Immunization and Infection Research in Cancer.



Phil Ko, PhD (Organizing Committee Member): Phil is an Associate Director of Research Development on Vanderbilt's RDS team. He has a research background in cognitive neuroscience and has held faculty positions at Vanderbilt and Austin Peay State University. Following his scientific career, he pivoted to science policy and research administration, serving the National Science Foundation (NSF) as a Science and Technology Policy Fellow with the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS). At NSF, he developed communications and analytics with the National Center for Science and Engineering Statistics (NCSES). Phil also served as a Science Officer for the Congressionally Directed Medical Research Programs within the Department of Defense.



Phyllis Danner, EdD, CRA (Organizing Committee Member): Phyllis is Executive Director of Research and Sponsored Programs at TSU, providing daily leadership, supervision, and administration of the division. She is responsible for pre-award and non-financial post-award administration for proposals and awards of federal, state, private, foundation, and local agencies. She is the project manager of all external information systems, e.g., Research.gov, Grants.gov, NIH Commons, etc. She is also responsible for assisting in garnering over \$100 million in funding awards during the 2023 fiscal year, conducts university-wide training and leadership concerning compliance and budget development, and is an adjunct professor at TSU.



Sufyan Baksh, PhD, MBA (Co-Investigator): Sufyan is the Executive Director of Innovation and Distinguished Professor of Business in the Department of Business Administration at Fisk University. He received a PhD in integrated marketing communication and advanced research methods from Texas Tech University and completed a post-doctorate at the University of Florida. He has an MBA in entrepreneurship and international business from RIT, an MBA/MMS in marketing from RIMSR, and a BA in Economics and Commerce from Jai Hind College (Bombay, India). He is a board member of Wahed Invest Inc. and worked for LINOpinion PR (Mumbai, India) for four years. His research in marketing, communication, digital transformation, etc. is published


in several internationally renowned peer reviewed journals and has been presented at leading national and international conferences.



<u>Lena Winfree (Co-Investigator)</u>: Lena Winfree is the inaugural John Lewis Center Fellow for Tech/Data Science at Fisk University. Lena is the co-founder of Rachel + Winfree Consulting, a data analytics consulting firm that provides data strategy and analytics solutions to small and mid-sized businesses. Lena is also Vice President and co-organizer of the Nashville chapter of the Blacks In Technology Foundation. In this role, she has been responsible for launching social justice initiatives (including equitable workforce development) that increase digital equity and literacy for historically excluded minorities. Lena also launched LocalTek-Thrive, a technology education initiative in partnership with Dell Technologies that aims to diversify the tech talent pipeline by providing Nashville high school students with opportunities to receive handson tech education, college credit, and industry certifications that prepare them to join Nashville's rapidly growing tech workforce. This initiative currently serves over 150 students in the MNPS school district, with over 90 percent being minorities. In addition to her business and non-profit work, Lena is an active part of the Nashville tech community. Lena dedicates her time by serving on the Women in Technology Tennessee (WiTT), the Nashville Technology Council (NTC) executive board, and the Nashville Technology Council's Education Committee. Lena has also served on the steering committee for the Nashville Analytics Summit for the past two years. Lena was awarded the "Women of Influence" (2023) for the greater Nashville area.

<u>Dina Stroud (National Science Foundation)</u>: Dina Myers Stroud is the Lead Program Director for the National Science Foundation (NSF) Growing Research Access for Nationally Transformative Equity and Diversity (GRANTED). She joins the NSF from Vanderbilt and Fisk Universities. She most recently served as Executive Director of the Fisk-Vanderbilt Master's to PhD Bridge Program and Director the Fisk-Vanderbilt NSF Center of Excellence in Broadening Participation. Her career has been focused on understanding and building relationships, be they molecular, genetic, personal, or institutional.



Lindsey Cox (LaunchTN): Lindsey Cox is the CEO of Launch Tennessee (LaunchTN), a 501c3, public-private partnership, empowering Tennessee's most promising entrepreneurs with capital, connection, and commercialization opportunities. Cox spent six years at LaunchTN before rejoining the organization as CEO in July 2022. She previously worked at the Office of Innovation and Entrepreneurship at the United States Economic Development Administration (EDA) - a bureau of the Department of Commerce, where she led the restructuring of a \$225 million federal grant program supporting tech-based economic development initiatives, and went on to lead The Company Lab (CO.LAB), a regional entrepreneur center in Chattanooga, TN.



Charles Layne (LaunchTN): Charles Layne currently serves as the Technology Advancement Manager at LaunchTN, where he works to facilitate the commercialization of technologies across the state of TN in addition to striving to improve the TN innovation ecosystem through policy, advocacy, and development efforts. These efforts include the development of the Tennessee Technology Advancement Consortium, a pilot project to create a statewide technology transfer and commercialization support office to increase resources available to participating universities. Chuck previously worked in Nashville and Memphis on housing, transportation, and public infrastructure projects. He holds a bachelor's degree in community development and a Master of City and Regional Planning from the University of Memphis.



Jennifer Skjellum (LaunchTN): Jennifer Skjellum is the University Advisor for LaunchTN's Tennessee Technology Advancement Consortium (TTAC), focused on providing access to technology transfer services, elevating the profile of university research, and increasing commercialization outcomes across the state of Tennessee. She also serves in a consulting role at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga as a commercialization counselor, working with faculty and graduate students to advance research commercialization in collaboration with the UT Research Foundation. She is also co-founder and President of Runtime Computing Solutions, a software and services company that serves the defense systems and high-performance computing sectors.


