

TREASURES OF ITALY'S FAR SOUTH:

Exploring Puglia, Basilicata & Calabria

September 26 – October 5, 2023





Dear Alumni and Friends.

We are pleased to announce this unusual and exclusive journey, tailored especially for Vanderbilt Alumni, exploring the wonderful yet largely "undiscovered" treasures of Italy's Far South. The regions of Puglia, Basilicata and Calabria are rich in history and natural beauty, with ancient cities that feature glorious architecture, important archaeological remains, and bucolic villages that have changed little through the centuries.

Known in antiquity as Magna Graecia ("Greater Greece"), this part of Italy, along with Sicily, is an area that attracted Phoenicians, Greeks, Romans, Byzantines, Normans, and others for its fertile land and the potential for trade. We begin our travels in Puglia, in the heel of Italy's boot, and explore the incredible village of Alberobello, a UNESCO World Heritage site that features over 1,500 ancient trulli buildings. In the neighboring region of Basilicata, we visit another UNESCO site in Matera's old town called the Sassi. Its labyrinth of cave houses includes frescoed churches and chapels carved out of limestone rock. In Calabria, the toe of the Italian boot, we tour ancient hilltop villages including Rossano, Gerace, and Santa Severina, which house treasures in their cathedrals and other sites revealing Calabria's long rich history. We conclude in Reggio di Calabria, which guards the Strait of Messina, the narrow waterway that separates mainland Italy from Sicily. Reggio's superb museum exhibits the incredible Riace Bronzes, two outstanding bronze statues from the Greek Classical period (5th century BC).

Accompanying our small group will be expert guides throughout who will illuminate travelers on unique history, culture, and culinary traditions of the region including abundant opportunity to enjoy the foods and wines that are unique to Southern Italy.

One of the great pleasures of the trip is the magnificent countryside through which we will travel, replete with vineyards, ancient olive groves, and picturesque hill towns overlooking the Ionian Sea. Life has changed little through the centuries in many of these villages, and in some, a dialect derived from ancient Greek is still spoken. We will feast on the local cuisine, including fruits and vegetables fresh from the garden, and regional specialties, including cheeses and wines. Our leisurely lunches and dinners – many of which are included – are sure to be among your fondest memories of your travels. Throughout the trip, our expert guides will provide insight into the history and culture of Puglia, Basilicata and Calabria, which make this part of Italy so special.

For those who are able to extend their stay, we are pleased to offer an optional three-night extension in Sicily, with accommodations in elegant Taormina, with its important Greco-Roman theater looking out to Mount Etna, and its promenade lined with stylish shops and boutiques.

We hope you will join us on this memorable exploration of Italy's Far South.

ITINERARY

Tuesday, September 26, 2023

DEPART THE USA

Depart the United States for Bari, Italy.

Wednesday, September 27

BARI, Puglia, Italy / MARTINA FRANCA

Arrive in Bari, the capital of Puglia, the region in the heel of the Italian "boot." Transfer to Martina Franca, an old and graceful town located in the Valle d' Itria, where we will spend the next three nights at the Relais Villa San Martino, a lovely country hotel, located just outside the town. Gather this evening for a Welcome Dinner. Meals: D

Thursday, September 28

ALBEROBELLO and THE TRULLI VILLAGES

Meet this morning at the hotel for an introductory lecture. This afternoon explore Alberobello, a UNESCO World Heritage site that features over 1,500 trulli buildings. These remarkable white-washed structures have pyramidal, conical or domed roofs built of corbelled local limestone without mortar, using a prehistoric building technique that has survived to this day. Continue to nearby Locorotondo, rated as one of the most beautiful towns in Italy. Set on a hilltop, the stone-paved streets lead to the pedestrian historic center, where the lovely public garden offers panoramic views of the Valle d' Itria, the surrounding valley. Independent dinner in Martina Franca. Meals: B


Friday, September 29


MARTINA FRANCA / MATERA, Basilicata / **MARTINA FRANCA**

In the morning, drive into the region of Basilicata to reach Matera, one of the most extraordinary cities in Italy. Inhabited since prehistoric times, Matera's old town is situated on the edge of a ravine and it consists of the Sassi, a labyrinth of

cave houses, churches, frescoed chapels, alleyways and staircases carved out of the limestone rock. Explore this incredible and unusual place, now a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Visit other landmark buildings outside the Sassi area, including the fine 13th-century Romanesque cathedral, with its richly decorated chapels; the Palombaro Lungo, a grand underground cistern with arches carved out of the rock; and the Museo Nazionale d'Arte Medievale e Moderna della Basilicata, housed in a 17th-century palazzo and exhibits sacred and contemporary art, including paintings by Carlo Levi. Lunch will be served in Matera. Meals: B, L

Saturday, September 30

MARTINA FRANCA / SIBARI, Basilicata / ROSSANO, Calabria / CROTONE

Leave in the morning for Sibari, the ancient Sybaris, founded in 720 BC by settlers from the western Peloponnese. The luxurious and excessive lifestyle of its citizens gave us the words "sybarite" and "sybaritic" to connote opulent luxury and the pursuit of excessive pleasure. Very little remains of the city, which was destroyed by Croton in 510 BC, but the museum exhibits artifacts from the excavations. Enter Calabria and stop at the hill town of Rossano to visit its cathedral, which houses the celebrated 6th-century Codex Purpureus (Purple Codex), believed to be the oldest illuminated gospel. Then on to Crotone, which occupies the site of

ancient Kroton, Founded in 710 BC, Kroton rose to become one of the most important and powerful cities of Magna Graecia. Here Pythagoras founded his famed school of philosophy. Check into the Hotel Lido degli Scogli for two nights.

Sunday, October 1

CROTONE / SANTA SEVERINA / CROTONE

This morning tour Crotone, including its castle, archaeological park and museum. After an independent lunch, proceed to the medieval hill-top town of Santa Severina, dominated by its castle, which dates from the period of Norman domination. Of notable interest are the remains of a Byzantine church with frescoed walls and of a necropolis of the same historical period. Return to Crotone for overnight. Meals: B, D

Monday, October 2

CROTONE / STILO / GERACE / SIDERNO

Depart Crotone in the morning and proceed along Calabria's Ionian coast, where we find the 11th-century church of Santa Maria della Roccella, a majestic monument despite its ruined condition. View impressive coastal scenery, before arriving at Stilo, a hill village that retained its Greek character well into the modern era. Stilo's 10th-century Byzantine church, the Cattolica, is considered one of the best examples of its kind in Europe. On to Gerace, another attractive village, founded in the 9th century by refugees from the nearby coastal city of Locri. The well-preserved medieval town is built in a defensive mountain crag. Gerace's 11th-century cathedral is the largest church in Calabria, indicating the importance of Gerace during the Middle Ages. Nearby is the church of San Francesco d'Assisi, which contains a



beautiful inlaid marble altar. Overnight at the *Grand Hotel President*, a beachfront property in Siderno.

Tuesday, October 3

SIDERNO / LOCRI / SCILLA/ REGGIO DI CALABRIA

This morning depart our hotel for Locri Epizephyrii, founded by Greeks in the late 8th century BC. Taking advantage of its strategic position, Locri flourished by developing commercial contacts with other Greek cities in southern Italy and Sicily. The first Greek city to develop a written code of laws, Locri was praised for its good government, and continued to prosper until the Roman period. The extensive remains of the city include temples, a theater, other public buildings and city walls. The museum displays a collection of artifacts. Following lunch, drive along the southernmost part of mainland Italy to Reggio di Calabria, stopping en route for a stroll in Scilla, rising on a rocky cliff at the Strait of Messina. Check in at the Grand Hotel Excelsior for two nights. Meals: B, L

Wednesday, October 4

REGGIO DI CALABRIA

Formerly ancient Rhegion, the earliest Greek colony, Reggio di Calabria is home to the superb National Museum of Magna Graecia, one of the best collections of ancient artifacts in the world, which we visit this morning. Included are finds from several sites we visited. The highlight of the collection is the celebrated Riace Bronzes, two larger-than-life Greek warriors dating from the 5th century BC that were found in 1972 by divers off Riace on Calabria's Ionian coast. The statues are perhaps the finest surviving examples of Greek bronze statues of the Classical period. It is believed that they were built by Athenian sculptors after the victory over the Persians at the Battle of Marathon (490 BC), and dedicated at Delphi. Spend the afternoon at leisure, during which you may wish to stroll along the Lungomare, a coastal street that offers magnificent panoramic views that extend beyond the Strait of Messina to Sicily. In the evening, enjoy a farewell dinner.

REGGIO DI CALABRIA / USA

Transfer to the airport for the return flight home. Meals: B




Taormina

Travel via ferry from Reggio di Calabria to Messina, Sicily, and enjoy a three-night stay in Taormina at the *Excelsior Palace Hotel*. Our program includes sightseeing of Taormina including its Greco-Roman Theater and a full day excursion to Syracuse, one of the largest and most important cities of Magna Graecia. Included in addition to the hotel and sightseeing are three breakfasts, two lunches and a group transfer to the Catania airport on October 6.
