ACTIVITY LEVEL

Travelers can expect an estimated total of 2-3 hours of walking at an easy pace per day. Since this program features archaeological sites and guided walks of ancient towns, excursions may involve walking on inclined or uneven surfaces such as rocky or unpaved paths and navigating cobblestones or flights of stairs without handrails. During site visits, guests may need to stand briefly if seating is not available. Boat transfers can require taking a few steps onto or off a moving craft with assistance from a crewmember. Embarking and disembarking from motor coaches and other transportation methods will also be necessary. Your willingness to explore will help you get the most from this unforgettable experience.



Friday, September 25

ATHENS, Greece

Arrive in Athens and transfer to the Hotel Athens Capital (or similar), conveniently located just off Syntagma Square. This evening, gather with fellow Vanderbilt travelers for a welcome dinner. (D)

Saturday, September 26

ATHENS

Ancient Athens was the birthplace of democracy and many other ideas and concepts that form an integral part of Western tradition. Its magnificent monuments that have survived from antiquity are testimonials to its glorious past. After breakfast, travel to the Acropolis. Explore the stunning architectural marvel of the Parthenon, built in the 5th century BCE as a temple to the city's protector, the goddess Athena. Also tour the Acropolis Museum, an award-winning collection of artifacts from excavations of the Acropolis. Following an included lunch, visit the Agora, the civic and commercial center of ancient Athens, where the carefully restored remains include the 5th century BC Temple of Hephaestus and the Hellenistic Stoa of Atallos, which houses the splendid Agora Museum. (B,L)

Sunday, September 27

ATHENS/EPIDAURUS/NAFPLION/MYCENAE/ATHENS

Today, explore storied sites in the Argolis region of the Peloponnese, where many ancient myths and legends are rooted. Cross the Corinth Canal on the way to Epidaurus, the sanctuary of Asclepius, the god of healing. Epidaurus is famous for its magnificent 4th-century BC theater, noted for its perfect acoustics and harmonious proportions. Lunch will be served in the seaside town of Nafplion, one of Greece's loveliest old towns. On the return to Athens, visit Mycenae, the most important center of the Bronze Age Mycenaean Civilization, and home of Agamemnon, who led the Greeks against Troy. (B,L)

Monday, September 28

ATHENS/RHODES

This morning fly to Rhodes, known in ancient times for its Colossus, an enormous bronze statue of the god Helios, one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World. A medieval stronghold, the town was constructed by the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem. After lunch walk through the Old Town, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, along the Street of the Knights, where crusaders lived, followed by a visit to the Archaeological Museum. Check in to the Rodos Park Hotel (or similar), your home for the next four nights. (B,L,D)

Tuesday, September 29 RHODES/CHALKI/RHODES

Today, travel to the tiny, seldom-visited island of Chalki, just off Rhodes' western coast, to get a sense of the rhythm of life away from major cities and tourist sites. Nimborio, the main harbor, is a vehicle-free area where brightly colored neoclassical houses line the waterfront, and where the Church of Agios Nikolaos boasts a beautiful bell tower and



a pebble mosaic courtyard. Explore the nearby abandoned village of Chorio and the medieval castle built by the Knights of St. John. Have lunch at seaside tavern before returning to Rhodes. (B,L,D)

Wednesday, September 30 **RHODES/LINDOS**

This morning, leave Rhodes town and travel south along the coast to the village of Lindos, where you will enjoy a lunch of traditional Lindian cuisine at Mavrikos restaurant. Tour the narrow alleyways of this lovely village, and then either walk or ride a donkey to the top of the acropolis, where the Knights of St. John erected fortifications to protect against Moorish invaders. The ramparts offer magnificent sweeping views across St. Paul's Bay to the Turkish coast. (B,L)

Thursday, October 1 RHODES/SYMI/RHODES

A short ferry ride brings you to Symi, one of Greece's most attractive

islands, with beautifully proportioned neoclassical mansions rising above its harbor. Named for the wife of Poseidon and said to be the birthplace of the three graces, Symi was an important part of the Roman and Byzantine empires. Visit the 15th-century Panormitis monastery and explore two museums—one dedicated to folklore, the other an ecclesiastical museum with rich collections of relics. Lunch at a local restaurant will be followed by time at leisure to explore the town of Symi before returning to Rhodes. (B,L)

Friday, October 2 RHODES/KAMEIROS/HERAKLION

A leisurely morning is followed by a drive along the western coast of the island to Kameiros, one of the best-preserved Hellenistic cities in Greece, where the ruins provide a fascinating glimpse into urban life in the period between the death of Alexander the Great and the establishing of the Roman Empire. After the visit to Kameiros, travel to the nearby airport for a flight to Heraklion, where you check in to





the Megaron Hotel (or similar) for three nights. (B,D)

Saturday, October 3

HERAKION/RETHYMNO/HERAKLION

Today is devoted to exploring Crete beyond the capital city. Begin with a drive to Rethymno, one of Crete's most charming towns, known for its well-preserved architecture from the Venetian and Ottoman periods. Tour the town and enjoy time at leisure before driving to the hill country south of town for a cooking lesson, olive oil tasting and lunch at the historic Kapsaliana Village Hotel. Return to the hotel in Heraklion in the afternoon. (B, L)

Sunday, October 4

HERAKLION

This morning, tour the Palace of Knossos, the largest and most magnificent Minoan palace in Crete. Clustered around a spacious courtyard, the palace contains a maze of rooms, passages and

stairways that may have inspired the concept of the labyrinth. Then visit the Archaeological Museum of Heraklion, whose eyeopening exhibits reinforce the impression gained at Knossos of the remarkable achievements of Minoan culture. Enjoy the afternoon at leisure in Heraklion, during which you may wish to visit the market to browse among the stalls that sell a variety of Cretan products, including its famed herbs. Enjoy a farewell dinner at Peskesi restaurant, one of Crete's finest, which specializes in the centuriesold cuisine of the island. (B, D)

Monday, October 5

HERAKLION/DEPART

After breakfast at the hotel, transfer to the airport for flights homeward. (B)
