On a campus as large as Vanderbilt, do your recycling efforts make a difference? Statistics gathered from Vanderbilt's recycling program say the answer is a resounding "yes"! Last year, Vanderbilt recycled enough cardboard, plastic, scrap metal, aluminum and glass to make a major impact on the VU and surrounding Nashville communities. How major? From 2011 to 2012, Vanderbilt achieved a growth in the amount of recycled materials from 3 million pounds to 5 million pounds, a 60% increase in the amount of material recycled! Way to go, Vanderbilt! Read more here.

Please continue to help us recycle cardboard and keep it out of the trash by flattening and placing cardboard at pre-established cardboard collection points in each campus building, behind recycling containers in your area, or directly into cardboard dumpsters or compactors located throughout campus at the Commons Center, Rand Dining, Branscomb, McGugin, Towers, and the Chestnut facility. # October is Energy Awareness Month – Slay Those Energy Vampires!

A silent menace may be lurking around your Vanderbilt office or home. "Energy vampires," electronic devices that slowly suck energy when they are turned off but still plugged in, provide no useful function and waste energy and money. Look for a glowing light that remains on even when you power off the device. That means it is still drawing power and is an "energy vampire". Even though each plugged-in device only draws a small amount of energy, that adds up when multiplied by Vanderbilt's thousands of students and employees.

Slaying these vampires is easy! Conserve energy and cut costs by following these simple tips:

### At the office:

 Activate hibernate modes on your computer and other office electronics such as tablets, iPads, photocopiers, printers and scanners. Turn them off at night when no

one is using them, if allowed by your area. (Standby mode on PCs will still allow the computer to draw energy.)

 Plug office equipment into a power strip/surge protector for an easier and quicker way to turn them off all at once. Shut down the equipment and turn

- Make sure that any disposable items used are recyclable;
- Bring only what food and beverages are needed for tailgate and take home any leftovers;
- Recycle all plastics and aluminum cans in recycling bins located on the concourse, at the gates and near every tailgate; and
- Bring items that have as little disposable packaging as possible.

<u>Climate Perspective</u>" shows that the effects of natural weather and climate fluctuations played a key role in the intensity and evolution of the 2012 extreme events. In

some events, the analyses revealed compelling evidence that human-caused climate change, through the emission of heat-trapping gases, also contributed to the extreme event. ### U.S. DOT Announces \$10 Million Grant to Improve Bus Service into Downtown Nashville

The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) recently announced a \$10 million grant for the Nashville Transit Signal Priority System upgrade from DOT's Transportation Investment



Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) 2013 discretionary grant program. The Nashville Transit Signal Priority System will upgrade decades-old traffic signals and add signal priority equipment for all of the fixed-route buses serving southeastern Nashville along Murfreesboro Road. The upgrades will speed bus movement throughout Nashville, allowing the city to provide riders with more frequent pick-ups and drop-offs without adding
