Vanderbilt scores big in 2012 Game Day Recycling Challenge

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recently announced the results of the 2012 Game Day Recycling Challenge, and Vanderbilt University scored



big. The Game Day Challenge is a voluntary competition among universities to see who can recycle the most and generate the least waste at one football game of their choosing each October. Vandy has generated impressive improvement over the past several years with a whopping 84% increase in our recycling volume at this year's designated game over last year's.

Vanderbilt excelled in the waste minimization category, ranking 1st out of the Southeastern Conference schools, 8th in the Division I Football Bowl Subdivision, and 22nd out of 63 participating colleges and universities, including Division II and Division III schools. 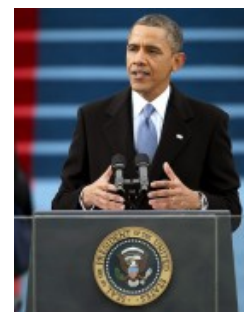
2012 breaks climate records
