Vanderbilt University greenhouse gas emissions down 10% since 2008

In recognition of Campus Sustainability on Oct. 26, 2011, Vanderbilt released an updated inventory of greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions inclusive for the calendar years from 2005 through 2010. Vanderbilt University has decreased its GHG emissions per square foot by 18 percent since 2005 and has decreased its total emissions by 10 percent from an



all-time high since 2008, according to a new report prepared by Vanderbilt's Sustainability and Environmental Management Office.

The GHG emissions inventory illustrates Vanderbilt's current carbon footprint and provides trending information over the past six years. GHG emissions per person, per student, per research dollar, per inpatient day, and per ambulatory visit have all decreased since 2005. Quantifying GHG emissions over time allows the Vanderbilt community to better understand its impact on the environment and determine the most effective improvement strategies to implement in the future. East Nashville Green Drinks – Nov. 16

On Wednesday, November 16 from 6-9 pm, participate in East Nashville Green Drinks, an organic, casual, selfNine electric vehicle (EV) charging stations are now open to the Vanderbilt community and general public. The stations are a joint project of Vanderbilt University's Office of Traffic and Parking, Plant Operations, and Sustainability and Environmental Management, and Vanderbilt University Medical Center's Parking and Transportation Services.

Five stations were donated by Schneider Electric and are installed in the following garages:

Wesley Place Garage: Spaces 52 and 53 25th Avenue Garage: Spaces 325 and 326 Terrace Place Garage: Space 63

Once construction of the solar charging stations at Lot 5B at the corner of 21st Avenue and Broadway are complete in early 2012, there will be a total of 15 electric vehicle charging stations on the Vanderbilt University campus. Parking rates for these lots are \$1 per half hour or a \$10 daily maximum. Electricity is currently free.

Vanderbilt University Medical Center

The four VUMC chargers are part of the ECOtality project, a federally funded initiative to support electric vehicle production. The VUMC chargers are intended to provide EV drivers who are concerned about the range limitations of their vehicles the opportunity to "top off" their charges at Vanderbilt. Charging will be limited to two hours per day in order to give access to as many users as possible. The Blink Network charging stations are located on the following lots:

- Lot 113 at the corner of Pierce Avenue and 21st (two chargers)
- Dixie Place between the Central Garage and Oxford House (two chargers)

Parking and electricity are currently free for vehicles using the charging stations. To use the VUMC chargers, users must register through the Blink Network and request a RFID card to activate the charging station. <u>More information</u>.

The EPA considers a product "greener" if competent and reliable scientific evidence demonstrates it is less damaging to human health and the environment when compared with competing products or services that serve the same purpose.
