VANDERBILT IS PARTICIPATING IN EARTH HOUR ON MARCH 28 AT 8:30PM!

Vanderbilt has been asked to participate in the upcoming Earth Hour event on Saturday, March 28 from 8:30-9:30pm. Nashville has been chosen as a US Flagship city for this unique event. The World Wildlife Fund is asking that everyone in each flagship city turn off all NON-ESSENTIAL lighting for one hour – more info can be found at www.earthhourus.org/nashville.

Both Mayor Karl Dean and Governor Bredesen are participating and fully supportive of this event. The Governor is ordering all state-owned buildings to go dark throughout the state while Mayor Dean is working with the downtown businesses and flagship members to orchestrate a DARK OUT of the downtown area. The Sommet Center and Tower buildings will go dark while restaurants will move to candelight and the honkytonks and music areas will go acoustic. Buildings such as the Parthenon throughout Nashville will also go dark.

Vanderbilt will be darkening all non-essential outdoor lighting on main campus during this hour, as well as decorative lighting on iconic buildings such as the Kirkland Hall clock tower and the Wyatt Center dome. If you are faculty or staff, we ask that you consider participating by turning off your office, lab, classroom and area lights before leaving work on Friday and consider participating at home as well. If you are a student, consider turning off the lights in your room that are near windows. We do NOT want you to do anything that might cause a safety concern, such as use candles in residence halls or reduce lighting levels to the point where you feel unsafe. SEMO is working closely with a large coalition of stakeholders to plan this event, including VUPD, to ensure that our participation is as positive as possible.

Now is the time to sign up for a summer CSA and enjoy locally-grown, organic vegetables!!

What is a CSA?

CSAis short for Community Supported Agriculture. It is a system that links local growers with local communities. Individuals or families buy a share of the vegetables and fruits that will be grown over the season at a local farm, starting in mid to late May for the middle Tennessee region.

Why should I buy into a CSA? I can just go to the grocery store!

CSAs typically use sustainable agriculture practices—no chemical pesticides and improved soil health means better health for you and your family.

Second, the cost of your share supports the farmer's work directly,

covering the cost of seed, salary, and farm equipment. Most importantly, your food is local and fresh. Usually it is picked no more than one day before delivery to you!

What comes in a share?

Each week, a share has a mix of enough veggies for 2-4 people for the week. A typical box has a variety—for example, a salad mix, spinach, peas, radishes, and a mix of greens including Swiss chard, kale, and arugula in early summer; and tomatoes, corn, cucumbers, zucchini, potatoes, herbs, peppers, garlic, onions, and carrots in mid-summer. Each weekly box typically contains 5-10 different types of produce, according to seasonal availability.

Two great CSA options that SEMO is aware of are listed below. Doe Run Farm delivers directly to VUMC each week while Nashville Urban Harvest operates a CSA out of the West Nashville Community Farm. T
