Remarks by Paul Jacobson Owen Graduate School of Management Commencement Vanderbilt University Nashville, Tennessee May 13, 2022

Thank you, Dean [Eric] Johnson, for that wonderful welcome. I'm so blessed to be here on this amazing day. Let me start by congratulating each of you in the Class of 2022!

I'm honored to be among the first to congratulate you and help you celebrate. It's really hard for me to process that it was 25 years ago when I sat in the seat that you're in today. When I think about being a student working in the admissions office... to now having my family's name on the door, I'm overwhelmed... and I can't help but think, what a blessing. What a gift this school has given me, to prepare me for success so that I can be in a position to give generously.

And that's what I want to talk to you about today, giving generously.

Each one of you is already accomplished in your own right. You wouldn't be here today if you weren't. And thanks to your hard work and the education you've received here, you're in a great position to succeed.

Nearly every day, you will find a situation in which you're called upon to help. And I'm not just referring to making a donation, although those are nice – right, Dean Johnson?

But there is no greater gift you can offer others than your time, your resources, your wisdom... essentially, a part of yourself.

I believe it is our duty to make the world a better place. You will find that, as you navigate life, success is measured consistently by what you do for others.

As you transition today from your academic life to a professional one, remember that this generation and those that follow will rely on YOUR leadership, YOUR stewardship, and YOUR mentorship.

It's one of the most important aspects of my experience that I took from here, and it remains the foundation of my professional mindset.

The number one thing I've learned to value as a leader is helping those around me fulfill their hopes, dreams, and ambitions.

I urge you, and challenge you, to look for every opportunity to help others, especially the students and young people who will one day come to you for guidance, the way you most likely have and will again as you begin your professional careers.

Also, look for opportunities for personal and professional growth – always. The world is changing quickly, more quickly every year. I took a chance to switch jobs and join General Motors, which is undergoing its most profound changes in more than a century.

The automotive industry is accelerating the transformation to electric vehicles, and autonomous vehicles, and it's exciting to be a part of it – and help make the world a better place at the same time.

Even as we face obstacles, we find new ways to navigate the storms, because at GM we have a team that, every day, is collaborating to learn, innovate and persevere.

I strongly encourage all of you to keep learning as well, and always be open to new opportunities... they're out there, scores of them, and they're waiting for your particular skill set. So be open-minded, be patient, and above all, be ready.

You know... Mark Twain once said that the smartest people he knew were river boat pilots, because to be a pilot on the Mississippi River, you had to learn everything you possibly could about the river... and then you had to learn it all over again the next day.

That was because the river's currents and eddies changed so quickly. What you knew yesterday might not be the case by tomorrow. You had to keep up with the river... or the river would overwhelm you.

The currents you will face will include new technologies, new discoveries, new ideas – new ways of doing business. And those currents will move swiftly throughout your life and career.

You have to be ready to adapt... so you can navigate this changing world. It's a little daunting and intimidating, yes, but at the same time it's exciting, invigorating, and filled with opportunities.

And by the way, from where I'm standing, you're all well-accomplished at adapting and facing down challenges already, given what you've endured the last couple of years.

Getting through this school is a tough task in itself, let alone doing so in a global pandemic!

I mentioned the collaboration I enjoyed so much while a student here – I can only imagine how much <u>more</u> difficult it was for you in the midst of COVID.

You have proven that you are flexible, resilient, and determined in the face of disruption.

This resilience will carry you, and bolster you, throughout your lives. You are uniquely prepared for whatever else life can throw at you!

As I've said, the future is full of opportunity both near- and long-term.

All you have to do is embrace it, and face it with the determination and grace under pressure that you <u>already know you have</u>.

I know that if you do that, you'll enjoy the success that this institution has you wellprepared to achieve.

I'm excited for you. And most of all, I'm so proud of each and every one of you.

I, and everyone on this stage and in this audience, cannot wait to see what you achieve, and what you do with the degree that you have earned today.

The sky is truly the limit.
