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LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

We are very proud to present our 2nd issue of the Vanderbilt University Creative Writing newsletter. As I perused its pages before going to press, the phrase "dynamic support" came to mind, which is the foundation of both undergraduate and graduate students' success.

This fall, we welcome two alumni of Vandy's creative writing community, Olatunde Osinaike, (BS, Engineering '15), whose book Tender Headed won the esteemed 2022 National Poetry Series Prize, and LA-based screenwriter Julia Seales (BA, English/Creative Writing '15), author of A Most Agreeable Murder: A Novel. Next spring, fiction writer Claire Jimenez (MFA '14), Edgar Kunz (MFA '15), and Anders Carson-Wee (MFA '15) all return to campus with new books.

Success of this caliber is the direct result of mentorship and available resources for students to pursue opportunities for personal and creative growth. This past summer, through the support of an endowment fund, MFA students attended writing conferences throughout the world and traveled to Ireland, China, and Hawaii. These immersive experiences allowed for extensive exploration that advanced their writing projects and professional network.

The Creative Writing Program also implemented two projects that are new collaborations with campus colleagues. Last year, in partnership with the Vanderbilt Project on Unity and American Democracy, we created a prize for the best poem written by students enrolled in any Tennessee college or university. Thanks to a collaboration between Vanderbilt University's Office of the Chancellor, Vanderbilt University Press and Vanderbilt University's English Department, the Creative Writing Program will launch next year an annual contest for a book of poetry. In the future, we will continue to further opportunities for new voices in literature.

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Last year, as part of the Gertrude C. and Harold S. Vanderbilt Visiting Writers Series, we welcomed emergent and established writers including Aria Aber, Carolyn Forche, Katie Kitamura, Uwem Akpan, Megha Majumdar, John Murillo, among many other fine writers. We are excited to welcome this academic year a roster of award-winning authors who imaginatively frame the most pressing and critical questions we face today as a global community. Additionally, this year, we welcome professionals in the book industry to campus including agents, digital storytellers, and magazine and book editors in a series titled "The Business of Writing."

So, please read this issue closely and discover the achievements of our students, faculty, alumni, and community. The newsletter only gives a small window into the dynamic conversations that occur in our classrooms, at literary events, and on the page. Speaking of which, once you read about their publications, seek them out. Their stories and poems do more than delight and entertain. They compel us to reflect on the function of the imagination in our time.

In conclusion, our long-time friend Rene Colehour took a position at the Vanderbilt Institute of Nanoscale Science. As our chair Jennifer Fay expressed, "She was the backbone of the Creative Writing Program and a stalwart presence in our department for the last eight years, and it is hard to imagine Benson without her. She is an amazing supporter of our writers, a cheerful and always helpful presence in the department, and a plant-whisperer of the first order, among many things." This fall, we enthusiastically welcome to the English Department, administrators Sally Buck, Meredith Moore, and Arianna Pappas.



FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: ZZ PACKER



What has your first year teaching in the Vanderbilt MFA program been like so far?

It's been really fantastic, in terms of the MFA program because we just get such great quality, amazing writers, and there's just so few of them, and it makes for a really cohesive, cozy and yet really thrilling environment to be meeting minds with these budding writers (really I think most of them are past the budding stage). They're really in this stage of efflorescence, and that's always exciting to me. Even though I'm thrilled always to meet my writing heroes like Lorrie Moore or Tony [Earley] in the fiction world, it's also really great to meet people who you can almost see tendrils of their career trajectory a little bit ahead of time, and you're really excited and that's great. There's so much writing out there and so much of it is competent or even mediocre, so when you see someone who's writing really they're new then it's and incredibly exciting, and there's no feeling quite like that for me.

What do you believe are the most crucial steps a Vanderbilt undergraduate should pursue as a writer?

Number one: reading. I will encounter grown adults who also neglect to understand that you can't really have a good template for writing unless you are a reader. You can't make it as a writer if you haven't read widely and deeply. Sometimes I'll teach at these conferences and you'll see people who really desperately want to be writers and they don't read; so for undergraduates it really is the reading. I think the second one would be exercises. If you do an exercise one night and then the next exercise the next night, you can see various mistakes and you can see in these short bursts what some problems are. On the other hand, you can also develop and target a writing muscle in an exercise that you wouldn't necessarily even think of isolating in a story. So dedicate yourself to these exercises, and they don't have to be successful. The point isn't the success, the point is exercising! No one's going to be good at the beginning; you start off little by little and you try to develop. The third one, I would probably say community because I think that having community holds you accountable to your dreams of being a writer. Having people who can look at your stuff and grow and develop is valuable.

What are you working on at the moment?

I'm working on a nonfiction book about the Breonna Taylor tragedy, or murder I guess you could say, and how it unfortunately isn't unique, and how a lot of the macro factors and that are kind of a perfect storm of bad public policy, city failure, city government, bad policing tactics and strategies as well as mainlining segregation have contributed to this and to these other deaths that we've seen.

"Throughout my career at Vanderbilt, I have often questioned myself. Perhaps I don't fit, I asked myself, perhaps I am too awkward towards other people? And then there was always the question -- Alex, what will you do when you graduate, when you plunge into the cruel coldness of a world? But against such darkness, creative writing shone through like a streetlamp, whose milky light soothes my anguish, hesitance, or reproach over my own incompetence in so many ways.

Alongside it, my knowledge from literary studies, my conversation with authors of the past, serves as a lighthouse on the shore, casting its light upon me as I load up all my uncomfortable emotions in a vessel and scrutinize it, slowly, sailing into the cold sea. (Yes, I sometimes see Shakespeare and Fanon and Fitzgerald sitting beside me and staring at my work as my pen spun fast within my hand...) Writing is a solitary process, according to Ishiguro, but my best, most cherished moments were spent communicating with others -- guest speakers, professors, my peers -- discussing with them, ideas sparking from the collision of thoughts.

And if I have any advice for incoming friends, it is to cherish these moments, to capture the goblins that danced in your head and attempt to fly away into the sun following your class discussions. Perhaps I will head into a career of research in business, of digging into some truth in the pieces of careless fiction slipping off the tongues of great marketers (and perhaps attempting to stop them), but I know that I will write on, in one form or another, as my career or in my free time, for once I write I will always be a writer."




Southern Festival of Books 2023


