## **Incorporating Improv into the Second Language Classroom**

Dr.Divya Chaudhry, a senior lecturer of Hindi-Urdu in the department of Asian Studies, makes regular use of improv strategies in the language classroom. With specialties focusing on pedagogy and conversation it is evident that her students enjoy and benefit from the use of improv-based instruction and games.

But what is improv?

Derived from theater performance, improv is the use of games, prompts or preorganized situations that challenge the participants to respond in the moment to the
stimuli, be it a question, an action, or a situational description. In the second language
classroom, improv encourages students to respond in the moment to the proposed
scenario without preparation, challenging them to use grammar structures, vocabulary,
and phrases that they already know to achieve spontaneous language production.
Improv activities can be utilized effectively at all levels of learner ability and when
appropriately scaffolded can offer students of differing abilities the opportunity to interact
with one another.
