Basic 6-Year Timeline

FIRST YEAR

FALL (1)

Take at least 3 Philosophy graduate seminars and ProSeminar (+11 credits)

Pass Formal Logic PHIL 3003 with B or better

Responsible Conduct of Research Requirement

Service: Help with department colloquium

SPRING (2)

Take at least 3 Philosophy graduate seminars. (+9 = 20 credits)

Attend and complete any mandatory Graduate School workshops

Service: department colloquium help, TA for 1000-level course (usually ethics)

SUMMER

Prepare to satisfy the Language Requirement.

SECOND YEAR

FALL (3)

Take at least 3 Philosophy graduate seminars. (+9 = 29 credits)

Take Foreign Language Exam by **September 1** (Arrange w/ DGS by AUG 1)

Service: TA for 1000-level course (usually INTRO)

SPRING (4)

Take at least 3 Philosophy graduate seminars. (+9 = 38 credits)

DGS Consultation to declare a field for the Field Exam (FE).

Service: TA for 1000-level course (usually Gen Logic) OR Instructor of Record (IOR)

for 1000-level course

SUMMER

Begin reading the departmental reading list for one's FE

THIRD YEAR

FALL (5)

Take at least 3 Philosophy graduate seminars. (+9 = 47 credits)

Complete reading for the FE, begin formulating a Focus Statement

Fifth Semester DGS Consultation, appoint an FE Committee

All course requirements *must* be satisfied by end of semester

Service: IOR for 1000-level course

SPRING (6)

Register full-time for non-candidate research; 9 credits. (+9 = 56 credits)

Focus Statement, to the FE Committee and DGS by February 15th

FE Oral Examination before Spring Break.

Service: Relieved of teaching duties

SUMMER

Conduct research necessary for designing and drafting a Dissertation Prospectus and form Dissertation Committee

Work on Dissertation Prospectus

FOURTH YEAR

FALL (7)

Register for 9 credits of non-candidate research. (+9 = 65 credits)

Must appoint a full Dissertation Committee (with appropriate paperwork) in the first week of the semester at the latest.

Defend Dissertation Prospectus no later than September 30th.

Service: IOR for 1000-level course

SPRING (8)

Register for 7 hours of dissertation research (+7 = 72) – This is the complicated registration time.

Attend Job Placement Meeting (w/DGS)

Begin preparing job dossier.

Service: IOR for 1000-level course

SUMMER

Dissertation writing. Prepare job dossier.

FIFTH YEAR & SIXTH YEAR

FALL (9 & 11)

Register full time for dissertation research (0 hours)

Job dossiers out (October-November)

Service: IOR for 1000-level course

Decide if Spring or Summer defense & graduation

SPRING (10 & 12)

Register full time for dissertation research (0 hours)

If Spring graduation: Complete and defend the Dissertation, meet deadlines for dissertation final versions, intent to graduate forms (usually early March)

Graduation is in early May

Service: IOR for 1000-level course

SUMMER

If summer graduation: Last day to submit intent to graduate for summer is mid-June. Deadline to submit final versions of dissertation is mid-July.

Dissertations should be defended by late June or early July at the latest.

Summer graduation takes place in mid-August.



Examples of category (A):
