Hydrozoans are rare in the fossil record as they require exceptional conditions in order to be preserved. Larson and Briggs describe *Bertratis ciurcae*, a new capitate hydrozoan genus and species from the Silurian of southern Ontario and upstate New York, which floated on the ocean surface and is the largest fossil capitate so far discovered. Paleobiology

The Ediacaran period is the oldest known period of macroscopic life in the geologic record, but of the plentiful research on its origin and demise, few studies on the sedimentary rock record itself have been conducted. Segessenman and Peters present a quantitative analysis on the Ediacaran-Cambrian rock and fossil records from North America, finding starkly evident correlations between the two, and suggesting transgressive-regressive cycles and expanding marine shelf environments coincided with the diversification of animal life.
