

APPLYING TO THE PROGRAM

Next Steps welcomes students who want to engage fully in a college community, develop their skills, gain more independence, and work toward a meaningful career. Eligible students must:

- Be between the ages of 18–26
- Have an intellectual disability
- Be able to learn to independently navigate a college campus
- Demonstrate responsibility and appropriate behavior when on their own

When they complete the program, Next Steps students walk in a graduation ceremony and earn a certificate of completion from Next Steps, a federally recognized Comprehensive Transition Program. Graduates leave the university as self-advocates who have gained:

- A solid foundation in lifelong learning through immersion in the exceptional academic opportunities of a top 20 university
- A clear path to a meaningful career through guided career development and internships
- Increased social skills through lasting relationships with peer mentors
- A sense of belonging to the university as Vanderbilt alumni
- A further developed purpose as active citizens in their communities

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Several financial aid opportunities exist, including federal financial aid, the Tennessee Lottery-funded scholarship, vocational rehabilitation funds, and more. With this financial support, many of our families receive more than 50% tuition assistance.

A world-class research university dedicated to equity, diversity, and inclusion, Vanderbilt opened its doors to students with intellectual disability in 2010. Next Steps at Vanderbilt transforms the lives of students with intellectual disability through inclusive higher education in academics, social and career development, and skills of independence.

The program is housed at Vanderbilt's Peabody College, in partnership with the Department of Special Education, which are both among the top-ranked programs in the United States. The program also partners with the Vanderbilt Kennedy Center, an interdisciplinary research and training institute committed to supporting people with developmental disabilities and helping their families to flourish.

Next Steps is committed to including students with intellectual disability in all aspects of the university and surrounding community. Students devise an individualized Program of Study, a unique guide for achievement in academics, independent living skills, career development, and university life. Each semester, students enroll in one or two Vanderbilt courses that fit their personal academic interests, needs, and future goals.

EXPLORING CAREERS

Preparing our graduates for meaningful employment is a vital part of the Next Steps program. More than 86% of program graduates find paid employment within three months of graduation. This far exceeds national employment rates of 18%. Each student's interests and plans for the future drive career exploration, vocational training, and on- and off-campus internships.

Our graduates have worked at places such as Best Buy, the Gardner School, Country Music Hall of Fame, Nashville Convention and Visitors Corp, Tennessee Performing Arts Center, and more.
