

GRADUATE & PROFESSIONAL CERTIFICATE from Vanderbilt Peabody College:

Dyslexia Studies

Intervention supports can have a substantial positive effect for students' reading and future academic outcomes. This certificate will provide graduate and professional students with the additional knowledge and skills required to support students with dyslexia in the educational system.



Upon completion of the certificate, students will be able to identify the brain networks associated with reading and writing and their disorders; describe the brain basis of lexical processing; understand processes for identifying students with dyslexia; interpret formative literacy assessments; use data to make instructional decisions for students with reading disabilities; and develop and implement instructional lessons for students with or at-risk for reading disabilities.
