

A Quick Guide to Graduate Student Employment at Peabody College

It's also a challenge and requires an investment of your time, money, and energy.

One of the ways in which graduate students at Peabody College are able to help with tuition costs, while also strengthening their experiences, is to take on student employment opportunities.

In this guide, we'll give you a glimpse into how graduate student employment works, who positions are designed for, and how you can find the right role for you.

An Overview of Graduate Student Employment

Employment opportunities available through the university are quite popular among graduate students. There are several different types, but they all offer the chance to get more experience, work more closely with the staff or faculty, and help with tuition costs.

The hours and responsibilities will vary, but typically these jobs are 10–29.5 hours per week. Most of the time, these employment opportunities are dedicated to Professional (Master's) and Ed.D. students only, not Ph.D. students.

BENEFITS OF GRADUATE STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

Part of what makes these jobs so appealing to graduate students is the financial incentive. In exchange for their hard work, graduate students can receive a full or partial tuition benefit, an hourly or monthly wage, or both.

Beyond reducing the tuition costs, the benefits of these opportunities include:

- Getting hands-on experience in your field
- Deepening your expertise in your area of study
- · Building stronger relationships on campus, especially with faculty
- Creating a network of people in your industry

Those last two points are really invaluable—the faculty you work with and the people you build a network with can advocate for you and help open new doors for your future.

THE COMMON TYPES OF GRADUATE STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

Generally speaking, there are four types of graduate student employment—teaching assistantships, research assistantships, graduate assistantships and various graduate student worker roles.



Teaching Assistantships

Just like the title says, the primary responsibilities of teaching assistants are to help faculty members teach their undergraduate students.

The exact duties will vary depending on the field of study, but TAs typically help by grading papers and assignments, holding office hours, supervising lab sessions, and giving lectures. All teaching assistantships provide students with an opportunity to grow in their teaching and mentoring skills.



Research Assistantships

Research assistants typically get assigned to a faculty member to help them with a research project. Many faculty members who have ongoing projects either through university funding or a research grant seek help to reduce the workload by partnering with research assistants.

Depending on the field, research assistants often spend their time either in the lab, reading primary and secondary sources, writing reports, analyzing data, or overseeing other team

members who are working on the project. Research assistantships offer students the opportunity to learn more about research methods and data analysis, while growing their on-campus network.



Graduate Assistantships/Student Workers

Graduate assistantships and graduate student worker roles offer students the chance to work within one of the many offices across Vanderbilt's campus, including student services, admissions, career development, tutoring and more.

Specific responsibilities for graduate assistants and student workers vary by office but often include event planning and management, student support, or communications, social media, and outreach. All positions offer students an opportu-

nity to develop meaningful connections on campus while learning marketable and transferable skills.

HOW TO APPLY

Graduate student employment at VU Peabody is decentralized, meaning that each office and department is responsible for listing their jobs and may have different application requirements.

In each job description, you'll see details for contact information, time requirements, compensation, and the application process. For fall employment, February through July is the best time to apply.
