Thank you for your dedication to our mission and for the many ways you support graduate education.





PLACING THE GRADUATE SCHOOL IN CONTEXT




GRADUATE SCHOOL UNITS

ADMINISTRATION AND OPERATIONS





DOCTORAL STUDENT EXPERIENCE SURVEY

All 3rd year Ph.D. students were surveyed between December 2023 and January 2024.

80% Satisfaction

Majority of students are satisfied with being a doctoral student and reported their program is meeting or exceeding their expectations.

80% Program of Study

Most students would select the same field of study and Vanderbilt again.

75% Faculty

Students were very or somewhat satisfied with the relationship between faculty and doctoral students and the quality of doctoral-level teaching by faculty.

90% Expectations

Students indicated clear understanding of the formal research expectations/requirements to complete their program.

89% Professional Development

Most students report presenting research at professional/academic conferences.

89% Adviser Support

Majority of students believe their adviser supports them in any career path.

90% Relationships

Most students indicate having fulfilling relationships at Vanderbilt.

80% Safe and Accepted

Many students reported feeling safe, accepted by others, and cared about by someone in the Vanderbilt community.





INTERNAL FUNDING

Vanderbilt University offers various financial awards, stipends, fellowships, and assistantships to attract top doctoral students, with significant variation across programs.



Lacy Fischer Interdisciplinary Research Award

The Lacy-Fischer grants support collaborative research across disciplines, encouraging innovative projects that aid in data collection and funding proposals with teams of at least two graduate students from different fields. These competitive \$7,500 grants enable teams to seed the collection of preliminary data, add substantively to a project or area in which the student is already engaged, and provide other information that can help develop a strong external grant proposal.

KEY PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

The Graduate School supports the holistic development of graduate students, focusing on academic progress, career preparation, personal well-being, and community. In the 2024–2025 academic year, several strategic programs were introduced and expanded to reflect this commitment.

- **Graduate and Professional Student Appreciation Week (GPSAW)** celebrates the contributions of graduate and professional students at Vanderbilt. Events like the Career Closet provide free work-ready attire for interviews and internships, with enhanced accessibility this year through a partnership with Commodore Closet.
- **The Write On! program**, created from student feedback, supports graduate students and postdocs in writing through workshops and peer accountability, promoting academic success and professional growth.
- **The Graduate and Postdoc Academic Success (GPAS)** office, with the **Office of Postdoctoral Affairs**, launched Effective Mentoring Strategies for Postdocs, a workshop series aimed to enhance mentoring skills, provide practical tools for managing mentoring relationships, and strengthen mentorship culture on campus.
