

Native Texan **Jim Beavers** moved to Nashville in 1991 to pursue a career on the business side of music. His work experience prior to songwriting includes stints as director of marketing at Capitol Records, touring musician with Lee Ann Womack, and college professor.

Since 2002, Beavers has focused primarily on songwriting. He has had dozens of songs recorded by artists Chris Stapleton, Luke Bryan, Dierks Bentley Tim McGraw, Hootie and the Blowfish, Toby Keith, Blake Shelton, Brooks & Dunn, Brad Paisley, and Faith Hill to name a few.


HIs compositions have received multiple CMA, ACM, BMI, and NSAI nominations and awards, plus he has written nine #1 songs. Beavers served as Chairman of the Country Music Association (CMA) in 2022.



Barry Dean is a CMA & Grammy-nominated Songwriter. He wrote Little Big Town's first number one hit, "Pontoon." His other hits include "Day Drinking" (Little Big Town), "Heartache Medication" (John Pardi), "Think a Little Less" (Michael Ray), and the Grammy-nominated "Diamond Rings and Old Barstools" (Tim McGraw). He won his first BMI Pop Award for "Girls Chase Boys" (Ingrid Michaelson) and has had cuts by Alison Krauss, Luke Combs, Blake Shelton, George Strait, Reba McEntire, Carrie Underwood, Maren Morris, Thomas Rhett, Brothers Osborne, Meatloaf, Jason Aldean, and Kenny Chesney.

Dean served as a producer for the critically acclaimed *Lorraine* album for long-time collaborator Lori McKenna and the Travis Meadows indy album *Killing Uncle Buzzy*.

Dean is the co-founder and CEO of LUCI, a mobility as a service platform bringing situational awareness to real-world mobility products. LUCI has been awarded 22 patents and won a *Fast Company* World Changing Ideas award, a *Popular Science* Best of What's New Award, a CES Innovation Award, and was one of *Time* magazine's Best Inventions.



Tony Lane comes from the small town of Comanche, Texas. He played the bars in Dallas-Ft. Worth and Colorado for many years before relocating to Nashville. Signing with Famous Music (later acquired by Sony ATV) in 1997, Lane quickly had his first #1 song, Lee Ann Womack's "A Little Past Little Rock." He continued this run with George Strait's "Run," John Michael Montgomery's "Letters From Home," and the Grammynominated "I Need You" by Tim McGraw and Faith Hill.

He's had cuts by Trace Adkins, Billy Currington, Randy Travis, Sara Evans, Tracy Lawrence, and many others. More recently, he co-wrote Trace Adkin's "This Ain't No Love Song" and Lady A's "Hello World." His song "Roll with It" became a #1 hit for Easton Corbin.

He currently writes for BMG Music Nashville.

Mhere Music History is Made



Opened in 1982, the Bluebird Cafe is one of the world's preeminent listening rooms and has gained worldwide recognition as a songwriters' performance space where the "heroes behind the hits" perform their own songs; songs that have been recorded (or will be recorded) by chart-topping artists in all genres of music.

The songwriter-in-the-round format that is now known worldwide got its start at The Bluebird in 1985, and to this day a typical nightly performance consists of four songwriters seated in the center of the room taking turns playing their songs and accompanying each other instrumentally and with harmony vocals.



Kathy Mattea, Keith Urban, Vince Gill, Faith Hill, Kenny Chesney, and Trisha Yearwood all performed at the Bluebird on their way to the top of the charts. Garth Brooks performed on both the Open Mic and Sunday Songwriter's Shows before he was discovered -- at the Bluebird -- and signed to Capitol Records. Taylor Swift performed in-the-round in 2004 for record label executives at the club, leading to her relationship with Big Machine Records.

Over 70,000 people visit the venue annually; many of them as a result of seeing the Bluebird on television, The Foo Fighters' documentary Sonic Highways, the feature film The Thing Called Love or the television series Nashville. The Bluebird Cafe has been featured in publications such as *Southwest Spirit*, *National Geographic Traveler*, *The New York Times* and *Rolling Stone* where the club was voted one of the Top 10 Best Clubs in America.

Crowning one of Nashville's tallest peaks, Vanderbilt Dyer Observatory is a Tennessee treasure. Surrounded by scenic Radnor Lake State Park and listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Dyer's telescopes have pointed toward the sky since 1953. We strive to inspire student and public interest in science through sharing the wonders of astronomy, science, and space exploration. Public outreach is essential to our mission, and we accomplish this by opening the observatory to individuals and many organizations for field trips, summer camps, lectures, special astronomical events, and the arts.

Dyer Observatory was the brainchild of renowned galactic astronomer Dr. Carl K. Seyfert who joined the faculty of Vanderbilt University in 1946. He was charged with the establishment of a modern facility to replace the original observatory from the 1870s that was located on the main campus.

Through his tireless efforts, Seyfert gained the interest and trust of numerous individuals, families, and corporations who donated money, labor, or materials for the observatory's construction. The observatory's namesake, Arthur J. Dyer of the Nashville Bridge Company, built the five-ton, revolving dome for the telescope and the steel planetarium dome mounted in the observatory's library.



The observatory offers many unique exhibits. The 24" Seyfert Telescope, housed in the main dome, was used for research until the turn of the century.

A 1/5th-scale model of the Hubble Space Telescope is suspended in the library's original planetarium dome. The patterned carpet underneath acts as a guide for to visitors to experience the acoustic effects of the dome overhead.


The main hallway explores the stunning Milky Way and astronomy history with floor-to-ceiling graphics.

In the lobby, the concrete pier that supports the telescope is encased with a display of historic astronomical instruments dating to the founding of the university. You may also explore educational graphics, a large-screen monitor, and the one-of-a-kind interactive stellar map.
