
What is onlooker play?



Onlooker play is when a child watches other children play. While they may make comments about the play, they don't attempt to join in the play activity with the other children.

Why is onlooker play important?

- Children can learn how to play by watching the other children
- Children can learn social skills by watching other childern interact with each other
