

Degree Program

The Vanderbilt Bill Wilkerson Center offers Ph.D. students one of the finest research facilities in the world. It contains educational and research space specifically designed to accommodate the Ph.D. program, with more than 20,000 square feet dedicated to graduate studies in communication disorders. The facility also houses service delivery programs for audiology, speechlanguage pathology, occupational therapy, physicial therapy, deaf education, swallowing and feeding programs, and otolaryngology.

The program emphasizes preparation for research and teaching careers in communication sciences and disorders. Prior to the dissertation, students complete two research projects, a teaching practicum and approximately two years of coursework both inside and outside the department, tailored to individual needs and interests. The Ph.D. degree normally requires 72 graduate credit hours. A maximum of 24 semester hours of graduatelevel transfer credit can be applied toward the degree.

Typically, students enroll in 48 credit hours during the first two years of the program. After the first two years of study and successful completion of the written and oral comprehensive examinations, students are admitted to candidacy for the Ph.D. degree. The remainder

of the program is devoted to approval of the dissertation prospectus and completion of the dissertation research.

Ph.D. training is integrated with the sponsored research programs of faculty members. The aim of the program is to prepare students to become teacher-scholars within basic or applied areas related to communication sciences and disorders.

Individuals considering applying for the Ph.D. are strongly encouraged to contact a department faculty member in their area of interest before applying. This allows the Ph.D. applicant and faculty member to discuss that faculty member's interest in becoming a mentor for the student. In addition to the broad scope of research conducted within the Department of Hearing and Speech Sciences, faculty maintain close ties with other departments on Vanderbilt's campus, including Otolaryngology, Psychology, Psychology and Human Development, Neuroscience, Computer Science, Engineering, and Special Education. Faculty from these departments are frequently members of doctoral students' dissertation committees.

Admissions and Application

Students with backgrounds in such areas as communication disorders, deaf education, biomedical sciences, psychology, psycholinguistics, and neuroscience are encouraged to apply.

The Ph.D. program has been developed for full-time residential students only. Applications are accepted only for fall enrollment (classes beginning in late August), with the deadline for fall semester applications being January 15.
