OVERVIEW OF OFFICE

The Office of Active Citizenship & Service (OACS) works to empower students and student service organizations to experience community and leadership development through pursuit of service and volunteerism, issues awareness, civic participation, education, activism, and advocacy. The growing number of local, national, and global experiential learning opportunities offered by OACS provides cultural empathy, immersion, and personal and professional growth.

CORE AREAS OF RESPONSIBILITY

- *Advise student service organizations* to promote effective and beneficial engagement in service and active citizenship
- Provide volunteer opportunities for students, faculty, & staff
 - Build partnerships with agencies and organizations across Middle Tennessee to maintain consistent opportunities for the Vanderbilt community to meet local needs
- *Offer service programming* at a local, national, and global level
 - Provide unique experiential living-learning communities in Nashville, Washington, DC, and around the world
- *Encourage active citizenship* through voter registration and involvement in political processes
- Incorporate leadership & professional development into a range of service opportunities

HIGHLIGHTS OF GENERAL ACTIVITIES

- Received award from the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll
 "With Distinction." This is the 3rd year Vanderbilt has received the award, and the
 1st year that it has received the classification "With Distinction."
- 57 Partnering organizations and Service Sites in the 9/11 Weekend of Service
 - The number of service projects offered in 2011 increased 20% from 2010, and 1,051 members of the Vanderbilt community participated
- Hosted the second Iowa Caucus Rolling Seminar from Dec. 31st, 2011-Jan. 4th, 2012
 - o 19 students and 2 staff members participated
- Coordinated the second annual MLK Weekend of Service
 - o The number of projects nearly **doubled** from 2011
 - 100% of the leaders surveyed indicated that they wanted to participate next year
- Approximately 4,020 volunteers participated in student service organization activities and/or events
- \$142,248 recorded dollars in donations given by students and their related fundraising efforts
- **109,448 recorded hours of service** & volunteerism by students

Established the Emergency Relief Coalition at Vanderbilt

 VSG Resolution passed in September: "Representatives from key organizations will be utilized...to connect and unify student organizations and the Vanderbilt community to create a school-wide effort to aid those in need in times of tragedy."

- o Focused on mountain top removal

• Hosted The Commons Voter Registration Drive

- o 372 First-Year students decided to register to vote
- Murray House won the competition, with 49% of the house having completed the voter registration process

• Held Commemoration of the 220th Anniversary of the Bill of Rights

- Formal dinner in the Board of Trust Room for 110 Vanderbilt and Nashville community attendees with special guest John Seigenthaler, founder of the First Amendment Center
- Worked with Dean of Students, The Vanderbilt Political Review, VSG, and First Amendment Center

- Panel discussion featuring fascinating guest attendees
- Featured guests included: David Halperin, former Clinton White House speechwriter; John McConnell, former Bush White House speechwriter; Sam Feist, CNN Washington Bureau Chief
- Over 135 attendees

• Iowa Caucus Rolling Seminar

- Opportunity for students to observe and participate in democracy in action. Students volunteered on candidate's campaigns, attended rallies and events, and debated important political issues with peers
- o December 31st, 2011- January 4th, 2012
- o 19 students and 2 staff members participated
- o 11 females, 10 males
- 93% of students answered "very much" in response to the degree that the Iowa Caucus Rolling Seminar helped students engage in conversation with others who were different than themselves in terms of ideas, beliefs, values, and/or experiences
- Quote from student: "It allowed me to compare and contrast the primary format to the caucus format. As a DC native, I am used to entering the polls with my head down-no eye contact. And if you are campaigning for a candidate, you do not talk to your opponents supporters- you stand far away from them and do not talk to them. The caucus was very different people talked to each other and even our opponents campaigners spoke to us. It was shocking to me-but helped me realize that perhaps the element of discussion is really what makes democracy."

MLK Weekend of Service

- Second time this weekend of service was offered
- o January 13th-15th, 2012
- Collaborated with Hands on Nashville to create projects and organize volunteer recruitment
- o 294 participating students, faculty, and staff
- o 27 Partnering organizations and service sites

Politics and Civility

- o March 12th, 2012
- Discussion with Artur Davis, visiting fellow at the Harvard Institute of Politics
- Engaged, discussed, and explored the relationship between ethics and politics for the 2012 election
- Partnered with Vanderbilt Political Science Department and Vanderbilt Political Review

• Maymester in DC

- US History 292: US Politics and Leadership
- o 7 students registered for the course
- o Explored the upcoming 2012 presidential election
- Connected students with top diplomats, elected officials, journalists, and policy-makers
- Partnered with College of Arts and Sciences and VU Office of Federal Relations

Experiential Learning Opportunities

Manna Project International at Vanderbilt's Thanksgiving Service Trip

- 13 students traveled to La Ceiba, Honduras to serve at a local orphanage, Helping Honduras Kids, which cares for children who have been abandoned and/or neglected
- Continued into the now 6th Year of the partnership

• Alternative Winter Break Service Trips

Alternative Winter Break successfully completed its 6th year of traveling service trips. This year ten service projects took place, up from the six sites from 2011's cohort. AWB had 55 Vanderbilt students participate in the week of service collectively providing over 1,593 hours of service to address a wide array of community needs across the country. \$1,300 in donations was also raised by students to benefit several AWB site partners.

• The Sri Lanka Project

- 8 students traveled to Moratuwa, Sri Lanka in May to teach English as a second language to high school students while immersing themselves in the culture of the tropical island of Sri Lanka
- o Contributed 1,280 total hours of service
- Attended 6 two-hour seminars during the spring semester to introduce students to the culture of Sri Lanka
- o 2nd year Sri Lanka Project has been offered

• The Zanzibar Project

- 11 students traveled to Zanzibar, Tanzania in May to teach English and engage in local culture
- o Contributed 1, 760 total hours of service
- Attended 6 two-hour seminars during the spring semester to introduce students to Zanzibar's culture
- o 5th year Zanzibar project has been offered

Leadership & Professional Development

• Service Leaders Conference

- o Held on August 22nd, 2011
- Approximately 85 service leaders participated in OACS leadership training seminar for service organizations

• The PREP Program

- 29 students graduated the year-long PREP Program, successfully completing the minimum requirement of 60 hours at their serviceinternship
- 15 students registered their internship for credit, successfully completing a minimum of 75 hours at their service-internship. This is 6 more students than 2010-2011
- o 5 students volunteered over 100 hours of service at their internship
- The students contributed 2,304 total hours of service to Nashville non-profits
- Students also completed 8 journal reflections and 3 reflection dinners
