## Please provide the course description below:

This course explores the biological basis for neurological conditions that were previously explained by folklore and early monster tales. Students will explore not just our current understanding of the cellular pathways and mechanisms behind each disorder, but also how historical perspectives and cultural attitudes shaped the folklore that arose from each condition. Students will learn how our rudimentary understanding of neurophysiology and cognition led to Johann Conrad Dippel's experiments at Castle Frankenstein that are thought to have inspired Mary Shelley's work. The course will discuss how neurological and cutaneous porphyria led to Nachzeher and vampire myths, how psychiatric disorders of the self led to the werewolf and witch trials of the region, with a particular focus on the role of Serotonin in these disorders. Students will travel to the locations associated with famous cases of Johann Dippel, Peter Stumpp, and the work of Hans Prinzhorn.
