Know Your Professional Schools' Requirements

Each health professions graduate program sets its own admissions requirements. They are <u>not</u> standardized. It is essential that **VU** students research and understand the specific prerequisites for each of their top schools.

How Do I Become a Well-Rounded Future Applicant?

Every phase of your pre-professional journey is crucial, but students should consider focusing on areas such as:

- o Admissions Test (MCAT, DAT, GRE, etc.)
- o GPA (Overall GPA & Overall Science GPA (known as BCPM: biology, chemistry, physics & math)
- Community Service/Engagement (outside of your comfort zone)
- o Exposure to the Health Professions (healthcare observations, volunteering, & clinical experience)
- Leadership
- Research

Frequently Asked Questions:

1. How often should a student meet with the HPAO?

Vanderbilt students are encouraged to engage with the HPAO at least once a year through six key support methods and resources: HPAO Website & Brightspace resource pages, email list, social media, walk-in hours, events and workshops, and individual appointments.

2. Do schools accept AP credits to meet the pre-requisites?

It varies. Some healthcare professional schools accept AP credits, and some do not. If a school does not accept AP credits, a student might need to take upper division classes to meet the requirements if the student chooses to use AP credit for a course. Medical schools do accept AP credit for calculus.

3. Can a student take courses during the summer at another college?

Some professional schools might prefer students to take the pre-requisites at their home institutions, but students are welcome to take summer courses at other college/universities for various needs/reasons. In most cases, VU will only allow students to take 2 summer courses away and transfer the credits to VU. Since students will be taking a minimum of 9 pre-med science pre-requisites (General Chemistry I & II, Organic Chemistry I & II, Biology I & II, Physics I & II, and Biochemistry), it is generally fine to take 2 away and 7 here. (The professional schools still get a good sense of how you did in your science courses at your home institution.) You must have courses outside of Vanderbilt pre-approved in advance to transfer to VU (early Spring semester). 4. Are online courses acceptable?

Online courses may not be acceptable for meeting all schools' pre-requisite requirements. [Exceptions may be made during the period of COVID-19, and individual policies are typically noted on a school's website.]

5. Can a pre-health/pre-med student participate in a Study Abroad Program?

Many pre-health/pre-med students study abroad. If a student is not planning to take a gap/enhancement year before entering professional school, it is typically done during the first semester of the junior year. It can be done in the second semester of the junior year with proper planning. Things to consider are 1) preparing for and taking the admissions test (MCAT, DAT, GRE, etc.) 2) determining when the 2nd semester of a 2-semester sequence of coursework will be offered/taken (ex: Biology, Physics, Organic Chemistry). {Keep in mind, many professional schools either require or prefer for pre-requisite courses to be taken in the U.S.}

6. Which courses count as English pre-requisites?

Many professional schools require a year of English with W (writing intensive) classes meeting the requirement in most cases. The W course can usually be in any area other than labs, foreign language, or technical writing, however, some schools may require at least one to be specifically in the English department. If a student is uncertain as to whether or not a specific medical school will accept a certain course as a pre-requisite, the student should contact that specific medical school to clarify.

7. Do medical schools require calculus and/or math?

Many professional schools often have a math requirement. Of those, most require 2 semesters of calculus and/ or statistics, therefore we recommend 1 semester of calculus and 1 semester of statistics. AP credit is accepted for calculus. Unsure whether a specific course meets a healthcare professional school's prerequisite requirement(s)? The student should professionally reach out to the professional school admissions team directly for clarification.

How to Professionally Contact a Professional School Admissions Office for a Specific Prerequisite Clarification:

When reaching out to a professional school admissions office by email, be clear, concise, and professional. Be sure to include all the following information:

- ✓ A brief introduction of yourself.
- ✓ The full name of the college/university where you completed the course in question.
- ✓ The course name, number, and number of credit hours (indicate if they are semester or quarter hours).
- ✓ An attached course description or syllabus.

Why follow this approach?

- Having written confirmation provides a record of the professional school's response, which can be helpful if the course is later questioned during the admissions review.
- Admissions teams are truly very busy supporting applicants year-round. To ensure they have enough time to review your request, reach out at <u>least one month in advance</u> to confirm the prerequisite course(s) in question.
